

TEACHERS' TALK.

Wednesday an Interesting Day at the County Institute.

Instructive Discussions of the Subjects of Arithmetic, Spelling and Reading. To day's Topics.

Wednesday was an interesting day at the institute. The subjects under discussion were arithmetic, spelling and reading.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Mr. W. T. Pollitt after which Prof. Shipp made a short address to get the teachers in line.

The subject of arithmetic was then opened for discussion and various topics were discussed by Messrs. C. K. Dickey, Geo. H. Turnipseed, Wm. Chandler, R. F. Gaither, L. C. Grimes and others. Prof. Grimes presented his solution of some of the most difficult examples in Ray's Higher Arithmetic involving the principles of percentage.

The most interesting feature of the morning was Prof. Shipp's presentation of the subject of mensuration. Starting with the rectangle he developed the subject through the triangle, circle and come to the sphere, without involving us in difficult rules. He presented the subject in a much clearer manner than does Ray's Arithmetic, and asks you to accept nothing on "faith," but demonstrates each principle as it is produced.

The first subject taken up in the afternoon was spelling. The different subjects were assigned to Misses Della Good-

win and Mary Nelson and Messrs. L. O. Grimes and Chas. Turnipseed. The discussion was closed by Prof. Shipp who is a strong advocate of the use of rules in spelling.

The last subject discussed was reading. Among those who took part were Messrs. R. J. Soursley, R. F. Gaither, W. R. Chandler and W. T. Berry. Prof. Berry having hurried through his day's duties in order to meet with us if only for a few minutes.

Prof. Shipp believes in not only getting the thought in reading but also the feeling, for, said he, in reading to another we do not express to him the author's thought but the thought which we, the reader, glean from the author.

The subjects for to-day are School Management, History and Civil Government, (combined), Psychology and Geography.

In addition to the list published yesterday the following teachers have been enrolled: Wallace Montague, Katharine Barkley, John C. Mannion and Alpha Salmon.


