

C. AND O. PAY TRAIN

Derailed in a Lawless Section of West Virginia With \$150,000 in Gold on Board.

SALT ROCK, W. VA., Nov. 19.—The Chesapeake and Ohio pay train, en route to Cincinnati and Louisville, lay for ten hours to-day off the track in a narrow cut in the mountain fastnesses of Lincoln County, near here, with probably \$150,000 in gold aboard.

The pay train came up the Guyandotte Valley Branch of the road, a distance of thirty miles. On this branch, which is new, no telegraph or telephone wires are up yet, and there is but one passenger train a day. The passenger train was just ahead of the pay car when the latter, both engine and coach, left the rail.

The men on the pay train had no means of communicating with the Huntington office and were afraid for any of the crew to leave to ride through on horseback, as the section is one of the most lawless probably in West Virginia. Finally a farmer near the scene was started for Barboursville, the nearest telegraph office, which was twenty miles away, to wire for assistance.

When the officials in Huntington received the word they had already started a special to look for the pay train, as they had become alarmed. The five men on board the pay train were heavily armed, and had any attempt been made to rob the same while it was lying in the wilderness on the Guyan, a warm reception would have been given the bandits.
