School at Winona.

Warsaw, Ind., May 15.—The Moody Memorial building at Winona erected by the Rev. J. Wilbur Chapman, has been tendered by him to the Winona agricultural and technical school, which is to open Sept. 1. The Patrons of Husbandry of Indiana will erect a building on the ground in memory of the late Governor Mount, and in it will be located the agricultural department of the school. Efforts are making to secure a government experiment station. The school is to be inter-denominational, and it is said enough funds have already been pledged to pay the faculty for five years.
