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DIED AT EL PASO.

Judge Napoleon Buckler, Formerly of Mt. Olivet, Passed Away—Wife Was Miss McCarthy, of This County.

Judge Napoleon Buckler died at his home in El Paso, Texas, at about 8 o'clock Thursday morning. Judge Buckler left Mt. Olivet, this State, over twenty-three years ago. He first located in Sherman, Texas, where he served some time as District Judge. Removing from there to El Paso he ran for District Judge within four months after arrival and was elected. He held this position some fifteen years and then refused to again become a candidate. He was a contributor to the text-books and stood high as a lawyer. He amassed a fortune which he leaves to his widow, two sons and a daughter. His wife was formerly Miss Maggie McCarthy, of Mason County. Judge Buckler, of Carlisle, is a brother.

RIVER NEWS.

Towboats Here This Morning Seeking a Safe Harbor Until Ice Runs Out.

The Gould laid up at Cincinnati Saturday, having received word there was heavy ice at Portsmouth.

Heavy ice in the river this morning, the first of the season. It came out of the Allegheny last week.

Congressman Bromwell has received a letter from the Chief of Engineers informing him that the cost of a survey for the Ohio river under the terms of the resolution recently introduced by him would not be less than \$150,000.

Pittsburg coal that has gone down the rivers to the gulf has been sold there to be loaded for the long trip around the Atlantic coast for consumption in Boston, where the famine is reported to be severe. The coal that is making this exceptional trip was produced by the People's Coal Company, and, reaching New Orleans, was sold to a Pittsburger at \$4.25 a ton in quantity sufficient for the cargo of a big ocean freighter. Thus it gets to Boston harbor cheaper than it could be carried over the far shorter rail route to New England. In Boston harbor it is worth \$10 a ton.

The Pittsburg boat G. W. Thomas with a tow of coal and the Kanawha boat E. R. Andrews with empties were here this morning, and if Maysville's ice piers had been erected last fall, these steamers would have gone into harbor here until the ice thinned out. The Captain of the Andrews thought of returning to Ripley, however, and the Thomas will likely seek a safer harbor. This shows what benefit the piers will be to Maysville, as they will not only afford a safe harbor for the boats, but it would bring much trade to our merchants from the crews of the steamers while in harbor here.

LIVE STOCK.

Condition of the Cattle, Hog and Sheep Market the Past Week.

[Cincinnati Live Stock Review.]
The cattle market during the past week has been quiet and generally steady; prices on the average have declined about 10c. per 100 pounds. Best shipping grades were lacking. Moderate weight butcher cattle are fairly plentiful. There is a better tone to milch cows. Calves have declined about \$1 during the week.

The market for hogs was weak early, but has tended upward during the past few days; prices now are about 5c. higher than a week ago for heavy and 5c. lower for light hogs. The feature of recent marketing of hogs has been the large percentage of light hogs at all Western markets. On Monday when prices were lowest top grades brought \$6.45, and light hogs \$6.05@6.20. Thursday top grades brought \$6.15, while light brought \$6.15@6.40.

Sheep have been strong all the week and are about 10c. higher than a week ago. Lambs likewise have been firm to 10@15c. higher. A good local and eastern demand prevailed.
