Oh no, that scandal in the Postoffice Department at Washington City doesn't amount to anything. That's what some Republicans would have you believe, but the more it is probed the worse it grows. According to the affidavits in the case the turf get-rich-quick schemers paid over several thousand dollars to secure favorable endorsement from the Assistant Attorney General's Department.

60T ENOUGH OF HIM.

The Courier-Journal Joins in the Demand for Chairman Allie Young's Retirement.

Protected by an order of court against interference by the Chairman of the State Central Committee, the Democratic authorities of Louisville will to-day hold the primary election which they had duly arranged for before the summary attempt of Allie W. Young to take the party law into his own hands and usurp all party power for the purpose of contemptuously trampling under foot the very principles of representative and local government which are the life of Democracy.

So far this amazing effort of Young to make himself the autocrat of the Democratic party in order to betray the Democrats of Louisville and deliver them over to the Republicans through the hands of John Whallen has only aroused the Democrats, both of Louisville and of the State, to the enormity of the outrage he has sought to commit. One result will be a more vital interest here in the election to-day, with a vote which will select the ticket that the party will stand by in November, and at the same time repudiate the man who in so high-handed a manner has not only abused the office with which the Democrats of Kentucky intrusted him, but has abused it in order to serve his own selfish ends at the expense of the Democratic party.

The Courier-Journal is greatly mistaken if the chief result of Young's course in this matter shall not be such an unmasking of his object as will end his power for mischief in the Democratic organization.
