#### BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Business Transacted at the Monthly Session Last Evening—What the Recent Census Shows.

The monthly meeting of the Board of Education was held last evening, President Sallee in the chair.

The Treasurer reported receipts of \$4,300 65 for the month.

Claims amounting to \$44 49 were allowed and ordered paid, together with the monthly salaries.

The resolution changing the place of meeting from the Public Library to the High School was adopted by a vote of 10 to 2.

The applications of U. T. Huff and Wm. Gibson for positions as trustee officers were filed. Also the applications of various persons for position as teachers.

Mr. Neabitt offered a resolution reciting the fact that the attendance at the colored schools does not require the number of teachers now employed, and limiting the number hereafter to a Principal and two assistants, the Principal's salary to be \$60 a month and the assistants' each \$35 a month. The resolution also requires all the colored pupils of the first and fourth grades inclusive living in the Fifth and Sixth wards to attend the Sixth ward colored school. The resolution went over one month.

Mr. John Duley was granted the floor and addressed the Board in reference to the sale of the Christian Church lot adjoining the Fifth ward school lot. The church desires to sell this lot and reinvest the money in a church on Forest avenue.

Judge Hutchins moved that the rules be suspended and the board go into the election of teachers, but there was no second and the board then adjourned.
