Meeting of the Board of Supervisors. The Board met on Monday the 14th inst. Present A. T. Cornish, chairman; T. F. McMillan, C. E. Boyce, members; T. E. Pulliam, clerk.

The clerk was ordered to post notices declaring the road from Williams via Spring Valley to Cedar ranch a public highway.

Bond of Phillip McDonald as overseer in district No. 5 was accepted.

The Board made the canvas of the returns from the constitution election which were reported as follows: Flagstaff, for the Constitution 91 votes and against 145. Williams 22 for and 27 against. Tuba City 14 for. A total vote of 279 and a majority against the Constitution of 65.

The Board ordered that Mrs. Hughes be paid the sum of \$10 per month for the keeping of Nora Bradley, an indigent child.

The Board adjourned to meet on the last day of December to examine the accounts of the treasurer and tax collector.

Who is Hertz. The man Hertz, of Flagstaff, Arizona, who attempted to capture a portion of El Paso's night police force a few days ago in the Bank Saloon, was fined \$101 and costs in Recorder Caldwell's court. It is reasonable to believe that had not Policeman George been luck enough to get his finger under the hammer of the six-shooter that Hertz took away from him when the hammer went down, that both George and Hertz would have received the death dealing missiles and two of El Paso's police force would be in their last resting place. The bold defiance of the law and order of our city by the man Hertz was superior to any act of disobedient conduct in the "six-shooter line" that has ever happened in El Paso without being accompanied by

death. Probably it is better that the matter ended as it did. Hertz, it is reasonable to believe, must have been reading items of the "bad man" in the Arizona Kicker.—El Paso Mercury.

Capt. Booth Dead. Last evening at his residence in one of the Smith-Gabel cottages, on third street, Capt. N. B. Booth died from kidney complaint after an illness of only a few days. The deceased was 56 years of age, and was born in Logansport, Ind., but resided a number of years at Delphi, Ind. He came to New Mexico a short time after President Harrison took his seat, as timber agent for the territory, but resigned shortly afterward to give his attention to the business of mining, and was interested in mines both in this territory and Arizona. Nearly two years ago he associated himself in business with Major J. W. Donnelly, the firm doing a big business as mine brokers and real estate agents. Before coming to this city to reside permanently, he lived for a time in Santa Fe, N. M., and Prescott, Arizona.

The captain served as a commissioned officer in the 46th Indiana volunteers, and received his scars on the field of carnage, being shot several times. His record as a soldier and his fidelity to the Union is well known. He was a fine gentleman and numbered his friends by the score.—Albuquerque Citizen.

The Townsite Case. W. L. Van Horn received a telegram from Prescott this afternoon stating that Judge Wells, has sustained the demurrer in the townsite case. This virtually settles the case so far as this court is concerned. But Mrs. Gonzales will probably appeal the case to the Supreme court of the territory. But the attorneys for the townsite have no fear of the result.
