In the United States District Court in San Francisco recently Judge Morrow decided that every Chinese born in the United States is a citizen thereof. The case was appealed to the Supreme Court.

It would be a blessing in disguise if the territorial prison is found to be located in California instead of Arizona. The prison would then be moved to a more central portion of the Territory, which would mean a great saving to the counties of Arizona.

THE Cuban situation is difficult to understand on account of the conflicting reports, but it seems to be reasonably certain that the insurgents are getting the better of the Spaniards, and that their prospects of success are brighter now than they have been at any previous time.

DURING the last year of the McKinley tariff law the importations of wool were valued at \$6,299,934. During the first year of the Wilson tariff law the importations of wool were valued at \$32,589,781. That is to say, that under the Wilson tariff nearly six times the amount of wool was imported as under the McKinley tariff.

ENGLISHMEN have recently bought nearly half of the capital stock of the Anaconda mines in Montana, which are the largest copper mines in the world, and the second largest producer of silver. They yielded last year 50,000 tons of copper, 5,500,000 ounces of silver and 22,000 ounces of gold. When a good bargain is offered in America it is not in the nature of an Englishman to stand back and sulk.

THE bond sale to the syndicate is assured, and the amount issued will be \$100,000,000, four per cent bonds. If this issue of bonds had been made in small denominations and the people of the country were asked to take them the entire issue would be taken at three per cent. But Mr. Cleveland would rather sell the bonds to a syndicate at a higher rate of interest than to let the people have them at any price.

THE Florence "Tribune" has entered on the fifth year of its existence. Editor Reppy says that "it is the successor of a long list of numerous papers that now fill a journalistic grave." The "Tribune" during the past year has been one of our best territorial exchanges. The Sun wishes Brother Reppy a prosperous year and that the people of Pinal county give the "Tribune" patronage enough to insure its steady improvement.

**THE FOLLY OF IT.**

About once in each year this community becomes excited over some reported Indian outrage, which when investigated amounts to nothing but a windy war between the Indians and some stockmen, and the difficulty is always settled satisfactorily to the parties concerned without outside interference. The Indian scare of the past week has been but a repetition of the past. Trouble between the white men and the Indians will always exist, as long as the races exist, but it is not the Indian troubles that cause any great injury to this section. It is the senseless sensational reports occasionally published in some of the territorial newspapers and sent out by correspondents of Eastern newspapers that causes the greatest damage to Arizona.

As an evidence of the injury done the Territory by these so-called Indian troubles the following extract from a letter by a prominent Eastern capitalist to one of the leading business men of Flagstaff, and written just after one of these foolish scares had been freely indulged in by the sensational correspondent, is given:

"Another thing I wish to bring to your attention, and through you to your board of trade. I was in New York last month with a party of business men of this city. We were there to see if we could raise money for a scheme that would have been of a great deal of benefit to both Arizona and New Mexico. The first banker that we presented the scheme to laughingly called our attention to the morning paper, in which was a long dispatch from Flagstaff, Arizona, and reading it one would think, who was not accustomed to Indian scares, that the whole Territory of Arizona would be depopulated before night and all the property destroyed. This was in nearly every newspaper, both morning and evening, and as I returned to Chicago saw it in both the Cleveland and Pittsburgh papers.

"While such things are perfectly harmless around home, as we all know out there they are simply sensational, they are absolutely injurious to the Territory and every one connected with it and working for its good when it meets the eyes of investors in the East who know nothing of the true situation.

"We gave up our scheme for the present, as the banker with whom we talked said in very plain language, 'You cannot expect people to put money in a country like that, not knowing where it will be in an hour.' It was only a short time before one other appeared in the Eastern papers, a telegram from Gallup.

"Of course I appreciate that it is impossible to keep sensational articles out of the newspapers, but it does seem that any one living in the town of Flagstaff desirous of promoting its interests should not start such a report knowing just how it must sound to people in the East, where we expect to get money to develop this country."

THE Toronto "Empire" makes the somewhat ambiguous remark that "it looks as if Canada would have to begin to exercise its rare powers of resistance to panic and depression. That is one disadvantage of being a neighbor to the United States." As only one way exists by which Canada can cease to be our neighbor, it is in order to say that this is very sudden.

THE Atlanta exposition was not a financial success, and the North sent more visitors in proportion than the South, says the New York "Advertiser." It is a brief chronicle, but it points a moral. The great cotton States have neither the inclination for an industrial show nor the price thereof. What Mr. Cleveland's "cradle of liberty" needs is Northern energy and Northern capital, and it needs these essentials right away.

THE annual report of Governor I. C. Hughes to the Secretary of the Interior has been received. It is the most detailed report on the development and resources of Arizona ever made by any governor of the Territory. In addition to the report of the governor there are reports from the commissioners of immigration of each county in the Territory. The report should be read by every citizen of the Territory.


