Fifty-one Miles of Hay.

During the month of May slightly over 300 cars of baled hay was shipped over the Maricopa & Phoenix road to southern California. On Sunday night alone, 20 cars were shipped out. A gentleman who is good at figures and who delights in making computations, estimates that these 300 cars of baled hay contained 90,000 bales. If all the bales were placed one after the other, they would make a string of hay 51 miles long, reaching from here to four miles beyond Gila Bend, on the Southern Pacific. If placed so as to build a fence four and a half foot high, the bales would reach from Phoenix to Mesa City or Kyrene. Illustrations like the foregoing could be multiplied indefinitely, but those given are sufficient to show of what magnitude even a portion of the hay crop of the Salt River valley is.—Exchange.
