

## TERRITORIAL NEWS.

A real run of 100 tons of ore from the Sheep Trail mine, in Mohave county, is being made. The owner of the property, Thos. Ewing, has recently erected a ten-stamp mill. The Sheep Trail ore is rich.

The News, of Williams, says: Garland & Ross, the cattlemen, have sold their Pitman ranch in Pitman valley, to two California sheepmen who will place 10,000 sheep in the valley. Consideration \$2,000.

Work is soon to be resumed on the Zika mines, near Richenbar, in Yavapai county. Daniel Gillette, the owner, has already spent about \$80,000 on these properties and expects to immediately erect a ten-stamp mill and give employment to forty or fifty men.

The duration of his sentence was eighteen months, which has been reduced by good behavior. Resendo Dorame was sent from Pinal county in 1866, three years for grand larceny. John Cady was sent from Pima county in September, 1897, one year for burglary. The time of the last two was reduced by work on the canal.
