Mrs. L. S. Drum had her right arm broken by being thrown from her horse on Sunday last. She was going from her home at Stoneman Lake to the S. S. Mr. R. Williams McIntire and Miss Sarah Belle Niedecken were united in marriage at the home of the groom's sister, Mrs. R. J. Arey, in Williams, on January 1, 1900, Rev. Mr. Geyer of the M. E. church officiating. Miss Niedecken is one of Flagstaff's fairest daughters and the possessor of many womanly attributes. Mr. McIntire is a prominent woolgrower and one of Flagstaff's popular and progressive young men. The happy couple returned to Flagstaff Wednesday, where they will reside, occupying the John Clark residence, corner Leroux street and Birch avenue.

The changes in the county officials of Coconino county were but few this year. Deputy Recorder H. C. Hibben entered on his duties as county recorder. George Hoxworth succeeded himself as county treasurer. N. G. Layton was again returned to his office by the voters of the county. James A. Johnson was chosen sheriff by a rousing majority and is his own successor. J. E. Jones, who has been out of office for four years, will occupy the district attorney's office for the next two years. W. H. Power succeeds himself as surveyor. All the incoming officers had filed their bonds some time prior to the end of the year.
