The Grim Reaper.

W. H. Thompson died at the Hotel Weatherford on Saturday, March 9, 1901, at 6:10 o'clock p. m., of pneumonia after an illness of three days.

Mr. Thompson came to Flagstaff in October, 1899, as a representative of the Pittsburgh Copper Mining company, who have properties in the Navajo reservation, and during his stay here he became interested in copper properties at Coconino Point. He was an active, progressive citizen and soon identified himself with the business and social interests of this community, and it was his purpose to have his wife join him early in May, with the intention of making this place his home as he had planned for large future development of the mines in which he and his associates were interested.

He was a man of kind, genial disposition and possessing a wide knowledge of men and affairs of the world he drew around him a large circle of friends who feel that his death is a special bereavement. He was a member of Fort Pitt Lodge, F. & A. M., and was an active worker in the interests of the Masonic fraternity and exerted his influence for the upbuilding of that order during his residence here.

Sunday afternoon memorial services were held in the Presbyterian church under the auspices of Flagstaff Lodge, No. 7, F. & A. M. Appropriate addresses were made by Rev. George Logie, of the Presbyterian, and Rev. J. H. Henry, of the Methodist church. The services were largely attended by friends of the deceased.

The body was embalmed and shipped on Sunday night to his old home in Pittsburgh, Pa. E. S. Clark accompanied the remains.

Deceased was a native of Georgia and about 52 years of age. He leaves a wife and two sons, who are all residents of Pittsburgh, to mourn his loss.

Flagstaff Lodge No. 13, A. O. U. W., initiated three candidates at their regular meeting on Thursday night, after the ceremonies a lunch was served. This lodge now has a membership of sixty-three.
