

ARIZONA HAPPENINGS.

G. T. Hend, of Indiana, is making preparations to establish a cracker factory at Tucson.

At Metcalf, in Eastern Arizona, Cosme De Leon, a Mexican, jealous and drunk, stabbed to death another Mexican named Regaldo, then seriously stabbed his wife and daughter, and fled to the hills. Rangers and Deputy Sheriffs are in pursuit.

One day last week there passed Nogales en route to El Paso, machinery in bond, consigned to Cigarrero Mexicana et al in the City of Mexico, from down the west coast of Mexico. The bond given amounted to \$238,777, the largest ever filed in the Nogales custom house.

Frank Main, of Nogales gave a bond for \$5,000 with Theo. Gebler and F. G. Hermosillo as surties and the attachment on the Monte Carlo saloon was released. The case will be tried before Judge Davis in December. This is the matter of Ramirez, who is endeavoring to recover the money lost by his confidential clerk, Jesus Mendoz, who committed suicide Monday after losing over \$6,000 Mexican money at Main's Monte Carlo.

Captain Burt Mossman, formerly of the Arizona rangers, it is said, will organize a party to visit Tiburon Islands where the Cannibal Seri Indians live. Charley Meadows some time since announced his intention of subduing these Indians but never carried out his plans. They are accused of recently murdering and partly eating some Mexican prospectors, and six of the Indians were arrested and are now in jail at Guayamas charged with murder.

The man found dead near Agua Caliente Monday proves to be Charles Nadeau, a prospector, 75 years old, who left Agua Caliente Springs July 23 for Phoenix with five burros, one of which he was riding. Two days later his saddle burro returned to Agua Caliente and a searching party found the prospector and two of his burros dead. The man was doubtless taken sick or overcome by heat, while two burros died of thirst. There was no evidence of foul play.

Governor Brodie returned yesterday morning from Tucson, where he had attended a meeting of the university regents at which it was expected that the question of the presidency and other matters would be finally disposed of. All the members of the board were present at the meeting except Chancellor Scott. It was decided to defer action in this matter of the election of a president until August 5. It appears now that Professor Babcock of the University of California, is in the lead with the board.—Democrat.

Wm. Stiles is under arrest and in the Tombstone jail. Stiles was indicted by the last United States grand jury in session in Tombstone a few weeks since and several counts found against him and Burt Alvord with reference to the Cochise hold-up. Stiles was in Tombstone the day the indictments were found and immediately after his whereabouts could not be learned. Officers have been on the lookout for him and yesterday morning at daylight Deputy Sheriff Porter McDonald succeeded in locating Stiles and effected his capture by surprise.—Prospector.

A flood burst in Grapevine Canyon, a tributary of Big Bug, a few days

ago resulted in washing out about a mile of the little narrow gage railroad from the Big Bug smelter to the Hackberry mine. The grade, ties, bridges and rails, all went with the flood. The grade and ties were washed down the creek, never to be found, while the rails, all twisted, bent and broken, were scattered promiscuously along the creek banks. Joe Mayer says the water was the highest in Big Bug creek than he has seen since the flood of 1891. Most of the water came down Grapevine creek.—Journal-Miner.

Last Tuesday morning one of the greatest hail and rain storms in the history of the county fell near Hackberry. The whole north end of Peacock mountains was covered to a depth of several inches with hailstones of mammoth size, while every ravine was a raging torrent. One mile west of Hackberry a small section of the Santa Fe track was washed out and the east bound passenger train delayed several hours. During the storm of rain and hail near Hackberry, Wallapai valley was turned on end by a terrific dust storm that hid even the outlines of the Cerbat mountains.—Mohave Miner.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

—OF—

GRAND CANYON TRANSPORTATION COMPANY.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS: That we, E. D. Woolley, Thomas Chamberlain, T. C. Hoyt, J. S. Emmett, and E. S. Clark, have this day, and do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a corporation under the provisions of Chapter 2, Title XIII, of the Revised Statutes of Arizona of 1901, and we hereby make, adopt, declare and publish the following Articles of Incorporation, to-wit:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation is and shall be "GRAND CANYON TRANSPORTATION COMPANY."

ARTICLE II.

The principal place of the transaction of the business of this corporation, and where its principal office shall be located, is and shall be Fredonia, in the County of Coconino, and Territory of Arizona. Branch offices may be established and the corporation may carry on business in such other places within the Territory of Arizona, and elsewhere, as the Board of Directors may from time to time deem necessary and expedient.

ARTICLE III.

The purpose for which this corporation is formed, and the general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by it, are as follows, to-wit: To own, conduct, operate, manage and carry on a general livery, feed and sale stable business; to keep saddle and driving horses and rigs and vehicles of all kinds for hire; to do a general freight, drayage and transfer business; to acquire and hold such real estate as may be necessary for the purposes of the corporation; to build, construct, own and operate toll roads, trails and ferries, and to acquire franchises therefor and collect tolls thereon; to acquire, own and sell water and water rights, for mining and other purposes, and especially for the generation of electricity to be utilized and disposed of for lighting and power; to own, construct and operate hotels and restaurants; to buy, sell and deal in general merchandise; to own and operate telegraph and telephone lines; and generally to do and perform all things necessary and expedient for carrying out the objects of the company.

ARTICLE IV.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00), divided into One Thousand (1,000) shares of the par value of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) each, which stock shall be issued at such times and upon such conditions as may be prescribed by the Board of Directors; and the Board of Directors is hereby authorized to issue any and all of said stock fully paid up and non-assessable, in consideration of the payment therefor in cash, or transfer to this corporation of property, rights, or interests of any description, or services rendered or to be rendered, and the valuation or appraisal by the Board of Directors of any property, rights or interests so acquired, or of services rendered or to be rendered, shall be binding and conclusive upon stockholders of this corporation and all others dealing with it.

ARTICLE V.

The capital stock of this corporation, when issued, shall be forever non-assessable.

ARTICLE VI.

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability, direct or contingent, to which this corporation is at any time to be subject is and shall be Fifteen Hundred Dollars (\$1,500.00).

ARTICLE VII.

The time from which this corporation shall endure shall be Twenty-five (25) years from, and after date of filing these Articles of Incorporation for record in the office of the County Recorder of Coconino County, Arizona.

ARTICLE VIII.

The business and affairs of this corporation shall be managed, controlled and administered by a Board of Directors consisting of five (5) stockholders, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business; such directors shall hold office for one (1) year, and until their successors are elected and qualified. The Board of Directors shall be elected annually at a regular meeting of the stockholders, which meeting shall be held on the third Saturday in June in each year, except as herein otherwise provided in Article XII hereof. Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Directors may be filled by the remaining members of the Board. The Board of Directors is hereby authorized and empowered to make and establish by-laws for the government of the corporation, and to alter and amend the same, and to make all rules and regulations which, in their judgment, are needful or necessary for the management of the affairs of the corporation, but no such by-laws or regulations shall be valid or binding until ratified by stockholders holding a majority of the outstanding capital stock, at some regular or special meeting.

ARTICLE IX.

The private property of every stockholder in this corporation shall be forever exempt from liability for the corporate debts of the corporation.

ARTICLE X.

The officers of the corporation shall be a President, Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Manager, and such other officers and agents as the Board of Directors may from time to time appoint. The President, Vice-president, Secretary, and Treasurer, shall be elected by the Board of Directors, immediately after their own election, and all officers so elected shall hold office for the term of one (1) year, and until their successors are elected and

qualified, except as otherwise herein provided in Article XII hereof.

ARTICLE XI.

The Board of Directors shall have the power to sell and otherwise dispose of any property of this corporation, less than the whole thereof, in the regular course of business, whenever in their judgment, it may be deemed best to do so; to encumber, lease and otherwise handle any of the property of this corporation; to acquire property for this corporation; to borrow money up to the amount herein limited, and to execute corporate notes, bonds, and other evidences of indebtedness of this corporation therefor and to secure the payment of the same by mortgage, deed of trust, or in any such lawful manner as to them shall seem advisable, on all, or any portion of the property, interests and assets of of whatsoever nature of this corporation; and to do and perform all acts and things necessary, requisite, or incidental to, or in managing and carrying on the business and affairs of this corporation.

ARTICLE XII.

Until the regular annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation on the third Saturday in June, 1903, a temporary Board of Directors may be elected by the stockholders as soon as these Articles of Incorporation are filed for record in the office of the Recorder of Coconino County, Arizona, and such Directors may exercise the same powers as though elected at a regular meeting, including the election of temporary officers.

ARTICLE XIII.

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended at any regular annual meeting of the stockholders, or any special meeting thereof, duly called for that purpose by a majority vote of the capital stock of the corporation then outstanding and issued on the books of the company.
