Allen Estate Settled.

Final settlement and distribution was made yesterday in the probate court of the entire estate of the late H. J. Allen. The estate was distributed to Arabell Allen, widow of deceased,

sole legatee under the will. It consisted of three hundred and twenty acres of land in the Verde valley at Peck's lake, together with the improvements, farming implements, household and kitchen furniture and personal effects of deceased, 4,999 2-3 shares of stock in the Jerome Power company and an undivided one-fourth interest in Squaw Peak mines. The total value of the estate is about \$10,000 or \$12,000, exclusive of the power stock and mines which are of an uncertain and undeterminable value.—Journal-Miner.
