MINUTES OF TOWN COUNCIL

Pursuant to law and ordinance the mayor and common council of the town of Flagstaff met in the town Hall Monday Nov. 27th, 1911, at 2 o'clock p. m.

Present: Mayor Bongberg, Councilmen Powers, Black, Finley and Hensing, Clerk Doyle.

The minutes of Oct. 30th. and Nov. 15th, 1911, were read and approved.

The street and alley committee were authorized to spend \$300.00 on the extending of Sitgrave street to Normal school.

At the request of the council the mayor appointed a committee of five to act and request the courtesy of their action in meeting with the committee from the council to consider the advisability of condemning four feet of the property of lot 12 block 5 in Leroux street in order to widen said street, and to meet at such date may be set.

The street and alley committee was authorized to have temporary plugs put in cement retaining wall being built by the A. T. & S. Fe. Ry. Co. in order to supply post holes for iron railing, they were also authorized to incur the necessary expense in distributing cinders to be furnished by the Santa Fe Ry. Co. for filling the street. An act ordinance vacating Chautauqua Avenue on the North of Block Six B. the same being in the South Half of Section Sixteen township Twenty-one N. R. 7. E. was referred to the legal committee for approval and to be referred to the council for action.

The petition to have a fire plug placed at the intersection of Fine and Leroux streets was referred to the water committee.
