TUBA NEWS ITEMS

Merrill, who has been a clerk at the trading post of Babbitt & Warren at Red Lake for several years, left the first of the month for his home in Maine, and after a short time he expects to remove with his family from that place to southern California. His place at Red Lake is taken by Earl Boyer, who has been for two

months clerking at the local post of Babbitt & Preston.

S. S. Preston and family, accompanied by Superintendent Jeffers, visited Flagstaff last week in the former's touring car, making the trip into town in a little over four hours. Mr. Jeffers and Mr. Preston were looking up matters in connection with an improved road this side of the Little Colorado river. The party returned on the evening of the fourth.

Keith Warren was down from the Red Lake trading post visiting friends at Tuba a few days last week.

The mercury reached 97 degrees above one day last week, this being equal to the highest figure touched all last summer.

Mr. Charles Spencer of the Lee's Ferry mining company, was in Tuba Monday last enroute home after a visit at Denver, where his wife is quite ill. He was being driven across the desert by Mr. O. S. Emblem of Flagstaff in his Ford car. The gentlemen remained all night at the school, continuing their journey Tuesday morning.

Mr. H. P. Marble and daughter, Zora, drove into Flagstaff last week to meet Miss Hazel Woolsey of Tecumseh, Nebraska, and Miss Fay Sanford of Humboldt, Nebraska, both of whom will remain several weeks as guests of the Marble family. Miss Woolsey is a sister of Mrs. Marble. The young ladies plan to later join the Marbles in a visit to California points.

Mr. Charles E. Krauter of Brooklin, Mass., arrived the first of the week, in care of his guide, Mr. D. S. Hibben of Flagstaff, and visited a few days at the school. He later continued his his way up into the Lee's Ferry region on a sight-seeing trip and vacation outing. He is thoroughly in love with Arizona, having made visits here on several different occasions during former years.

Dr. C. C. Collins of Albuquerque, N. M. arrived Tuesday afternoon, with his driver, Mr. Smith of Flagstaff, and will spend some weeks superintending the dipping of sheep on the reservation. He is sent here by the department of agriculture.

An informal dance was participated in by employees and guests at the assembly hall on Monday evening, there being about a dozen couples present.

Mrs. J. J. Conklin, who has been in very poor health for some time, shows considerable improvement lately, and on Wednesday morning left in the Preston automobile, accompanied by her husband and daughter, Mrs. Constance Clark, for Long Beach, Cal., where the two ladies will remain for some time. Mr. Conklin, after getting his wife comfortably located will return to his duties as additional farmer at this agency.

Mathew M. Murphy, supervisor of farming on this reservation, left the middle of last week for the Marsh Pass district, where he will superintend the construction of a number of tanks for use of the Indian flocks. He was accompanied by his wife, who arrived a short time ago to spend the summer here.

A reception was given to the young lady visitors at the assembly hall on Saturday evening, a large crowd being in attendance. Dancing was indulged in and a short program rendered, consisting of literary and musical numbers. An impromptu talk was given by Miss Evelyn Snelling, filled with good advice, and Dr. C. W. Mullikin followed with an interesting paper on "Tuba." Instrumental duets (piano) were rendered by Miss Marble and Mr. Keeling, with vocal selections by a mixed quartet—Misses Toupin and Marble, and Messrs. Keeling and Hart. Mrs. Bush recited, and at the close of the program refreshments, consisting of ice cream and wafers, were served.

Walter C. Stanton, temporary employee, who has been in charge of a force of workmen engaged on the Marsh Pass road, completed his task and returned this week to Tuba. He will at once take up the work of improving the road between this point and the Little Colorado river.

A heavy rain out on the desert filled the tanks and water holes along the road to Flagstaff, and the trip in can now be made without loss of time in searching for water.

Rev. John Butler, who has been at Flagstaff making the acquaintance of his new boy, arrived home last week.

Numerous visitors at the school at this time are making use of all the available quarters, which are not plentiful at the best.

The contract for the construction of the proposed new school house at this place has been let to W. D. Lovell of Minneapolis at \$16,800, and it is presumed work will start on the structure at an early date. The specifications call for completion of the work within 150 days from date of approval of the contract.

The first cutting of alfalfa at the Wash farm has been baled and is in fine shape.

Rev. J. B. Frey returned last week from a visit at Flagstaff, and is now entertaining a number of visitors who are connected with the missionary branch of the Mennonite church.

School work at both the Navajo boarding school and the Moen-Copi day school will end with this week, and next week will be devoted to getting things into shape for the vacation season. Closing exercises at the boarding school will be held at the assembly hall on Thursday evening of next week. The children will leave for their homes on the 22nd instant.

Plans have been laid for a "chicken pull" at the close of school as a means of entertaining the large number of native visitors from different parts of the reservation.

The roof is about completed on the Babbitt & Preston trading post and the finishing of the interior will soon be taken up.

The Hopi students are expected home from the Riverside school next week; quite a number of the parents are planning to leave for Flagstaff to meet them on the 18th instant.
