The Battery team will play the Winslow regulars at Winslow on Sunday. The teams have met twice and each has trounced the other. The Winslow team has defeated the Albuquerque Grays twice, the last time, on Sunday, at Albuquerque, in a 12-inning game, by a 10-8 score.

The Winslow Indians play the Town team here on Sunday. The Indians are a new team, but have been winning consistently.

The Battery, after a series of four games on the road, now have five straight at home—with Jerome, on August 1; a double-header with the Phoenix Standard Oil team on Saturday and Sunday, August 7 and 8; Kingman, August 5; Winslow regulars, August 22; Clarkdale, August 29. Two games will be played here on Sunday, Sept. 5, and Monday (Labor Day) Sept. 6, probably with the Albuquerque Grays.

The Flagstaff-Williams game was featured by both heavy hitting and errors on Flagstaff's part. The local boys pulled a rally in the seventh, but couldn't overcome the heavy lead Williams had on them.

Sullivan and Kelly have greatly strengthened their team in the last few days, several new faces appearing in the line-up. Among them some star players from the east. Wetzell, shortstop, whose chief claim to fame is as a pitcher, performed in the box for Des Moines in the Central league. Fulton and Ennis are both league players on vacation, while Hagle starred for years on various big league teams.

Senator Roberts Promises To Remedy Land Office

C. M. Roberts, from the tall timber of Cochise county, who is making a strenuous race for the democratic nomination for the office of governor, was in Flagstaff a couple of days the first of the week advising friends of his prospects of winning and endeavoring to ad more votes to his string in the coming primary. The democratic fight is getting real warm between Sims, Winsor and Roberts.

In a short interview with a Sun representative Senator Roberts said: "I have assurances of the support of the greater part of the leaders of the democratic party in the different counties of the state and feel certain that I will come through the primaries with a good majority. When I am elected governor I promise the people to use every effort to abolish the present state land board and have a land commissioner appointed by the governor, for the land commissioner should be held responsible to the people instead of being able to hide behind a board of five or six men. This will avoid many of the unpleasant experiences of the past in the handling of this most important office. I believe such a change would bring about the desired results and give all the people a fair chance to secure homes and lands they are entitled to from the state. In the past the state, which is to say the people, as an owner has been the last to receive any consideration from the land department."

"There are too many commissions in this state and I stand for abolishing all of them except the tax commission, and for reducing the corporation commission to one man. There is too much junketing over the country at state expense with no good accomplished," declared Roberts.

It may be said with a great degree of sincerity that there are many people in this section who are willing to let Senator Roberts go the limit along the lines he has outlined.

WM. BEESON IS CANDIDATE FOR COUNTY ASSESSOR

Wm. Beeson announces that he will be a candidate for the nomination on the republican ticket at the primaries to be held September 7th, next, and his friends claim that he will be a sure winner in the contest as well as in the contest to follow this fall.

Billy is a native son of Flagstaff and there are few people in the county who do not know him and know of his long record as a man who never shirked a duty or passed by a needy friend. He is at present located on his homestead just west of Flagstaff which he located some years ago, and has proven his ability as a real "dirt" farmer by making the virgin soil produce fine crops. His friends fully realize the great importance of the work and in supporting him for the office know that he will deliver the goods according to law and have no fear for his ability to handle the affairs of the office with credit to himself and to the satisfaction of the people.

At the present time there is no opposition among the republicans for the nomination and there are many warm friends on both sides of the political fence who are ardent supporters of his candidacy.

REQUIREMENTS OF MILITARY REGISTER

In accordance with the Revised Statutes of Arizona, of 1918, it is the duty of the County Recorders of their respective counties to prepare a Military Register on which shall be entered the names of the voters of his county, and who are now serving in the army, navy or other part of the military establishment of this State or of the United States.

Every public officer and citizen shall furnish the Recorder such information as he may possess relating to absent voters who are in the military establishments of the State.

The public can aid us materially, if they will furnish us with the information regarding the voters in the service, and enabling us to complete the Military Register.
