Location of One of Our Big Bonanzas.

AN OUTSIDE OPINION.

The accounts which reach us from all sections of Arizona are exceedingly encouraging. The work of prospecting and development is going steadily on from the extreme northern point of the Territory adjoining the Utah line to the very borders of Sonora. Thus far the happiest results have been accomplished in the neighborhood of Prescott, in the Silver King district, at Castle Dome, in the Globe District, and near Tucson. The promising developments come to us from the Oro Blanco mines, South of Tucson, and in the immediate neighborhood of the Santa Rita mines, which have been made so familiar to our people from the prospecting operations of Col. Boyle. The four million dollars' worth of bullion sent abroad from Arizona last year will very likely, be increased to eight millions the current year. This will place the territory, as treasure producer, before Idaho and on a par with Montana and Utah. Arizona mines are now called regularly on the stock boards at San Francisco and the transactions in them are beginning to be quite noticeable.
