The preliminary examination of Jose Morales and Jose La Cruz for assault with an intent to commit murder on Deputy Sheriff Phyl July 16th, occupied the attention of Judge Rumburg last Thursday. Morales was discharged. La Cruz was held to await the action of the Grand Jury in the sum of \$1,000, and failing to give said bonds, he is occupying quarters in the county jail and growing fat on three meals a day.

Where they are Located, the Amount of Work Done-Their Future Prospects.

## STONEWALL JACKSON MINE.

Located in the foothills of the Apache mountains, in the eastern part of the Territory, is situated McMillenville, the principle mining town of Maricopa county. This place derives most of its support from the Stonewall Jackson mine, which is about one-half mile to the southwest. Owing to a very rich strike having been made in this mine on the 29th of June, which will attract considerable attention to this locality, we have obtained some interesting notes of that district. The

STONEWALL JACKSON MINE. Is the property of the McMillenville Mining Company, a California incorporation. The mine was discovered by McMillan in March, 1876, and sold to its present owners in August of the following year, for \$120,000. The Company have spent over \$50,000 in prospecting their property, and have received nearly \$50,000 from ore worked at the mill of Silas Tidwell in McMillenville, and shipped fifteen tons of high grade ore to San Francisco, that was valued at \$8,000 per ton. Up to within the past month, work had been confined to a rich strata, running parallel with and on the south side of the main vein, and from which all their rich ore had been extracted. At a depth of 125 feet, Mr. Freeman, Superintendent, gave orders to run a drift from that level to the main ledge, which resulted in striking the vein in 37 feet. Last Monday the drift had been run into the ledge a distance of 14 feet, and stopping commenced, to make room for the workmen, after which the drift will be continued to determine the width of their new find. The working shaft on the north side of the main vein is now down deep enough to run a drift to connect with that from the other side. The ore body is estimated to be 60 feet wide at this depth. The first two weeks after striking the ledge, they extracted 8 tons of first-class ore, 1 1/2 tons second-class and 100 tons third-class ore. Five tons of first-class ore, valued at \$25,000 was shipped to San Francisco, July 17th; five tons of the second-class ore has been worked at the Tidwell's mill which netted \$800 to the ton. The other work done on the mine is a tunnel started on the southwestern portion of the location and run in on the rich strata, striking the 125-foot shaft at a depth of 58 feet. The air for the mine is forced through a wooden pipe, that runs through this tunnel. A shaft 130 feet deep has been sunk near the mouth of this tunnel, in the bottom of which a cross-cut has been made. The northeast extension of the Stonewall Jackson is the

HANNIBAL.

This mine is now owned in San Francisco, and was purchased from its former owners for \$10,000. An incline 90 feet deep has been sunk on the ore body. This incline has 30 feet of water in it. The main shaft is down 75 feet with about 20 feet of water. Work has been suspended since striking water, but will resume as soon as the hoisting and pumping machinery, now en route, shall arrive. Josiah Flournoy, acting Superintendent, expects to strike at a depth of 125 feet, the same rich body of ore lately struck in the Stonewall Jackson. The Company have also a shaft 100 feet deep on the northeast end of the location. Fifty cords of wood have been delivered at the mine and as soon as the machinery arrives, a large number of men will be put on and the work of development rapidly pushed forward. Ed. L. Cummings, one of the Board of Directors has taken up his residence at the mine. The office of the company in San Francisco is at the Pacific Bank.

GENERAL LEE.

This mine is the first southwest extension of the Stonewall Jackson. This company has done some 500 feet of work in drifts, shafts and winzes. On the northeast end an incline 80 feet deep has been sunk on the ore vein in the expectation of striking the rich strata of the Stonewall. In the bottom of this incline, a drift 100 feet long has been run which shows the ore body to be 68 feet wide. Two winzes 40 and 42 feet have been sunk from a

THREE cases of small-pox are now in the valley. Guards have been placed and every precaution taken to prevent its spread.

F. G. PECK, clerk with A. M. James & Co. was severely bitten by a dog belonging to the Telegraph of five last Sunday. It took two shots to kill the animal.

OF the three cases of small-pox, in the Cavinass family, Mrs. Cavinass died Wednesday evening. The husband and father is no better but the daughter is recovering.

WE learn that suit will be commenced in the District Court by Wm. Isaac against the Maricopa Ditch Company for \$2,000 damages for failing to furnish water according to the terms of the contract.

THE telegraph office seems to be demoralized. J. W. Harrison was attacked with a severe case of sickness last Saturday and was taken to Camp McDowell for treatment, and on Monday Wm. Baber was taken down with a case of pleurisy. Mr. Dousuchet from Prescott, is expected by this morning's stage to occupy a position in the office.
