

LETTER FROM GLOBE CITY.

REGULAR CORRESPONDENCE OF THE HERALD. GLOBE CITY, Aug. 16, 1878. Your townsmen, Col. King S. Woolsey and Major Cox, have been visiting this district and left Globe today for Phoenix by way of Florence. It gave much pleasure to the many friends of Woolsey to know that he was a candidate for delegate to Congress. There are some of the "old-timers" here who knew him in other days and who will come to his support next November. Last evening there was an impromptu meeting held on Broad street in this place, at which a large number of people assembled. Col. Woolsey was called on for a speech and told the boys who he was and that he was a candidate for delegate to Congress. Major Cox followed the Colonel and made a pleasant speech, in which he made reference in laudable terms to the candidacy of Woolsey. F. L. B. Goodwin was called upon but did not express any opinion on the delegate question, except that he favored the election of some one who would faithfully represent the interests of the whole Territory, regardless of section. He did not tell us that he was a candidate for the Council. So far, local politics are not agitated in Globe. No candidates here, unless Judge Goodwin runs for the Council, which seems to be the wish of many. J. J. of McMillenville, will receive a good support for the Legislature, and J. H. Lively, of the same place, seems to be the choice of your part of the county for Supervisor. McMillenville will poll about 300 votes and Globe, if they all register, will add about 350 to the voting population of the Territory.

THE WHEAT CROP OF THE UNITED STATES.

San Francisco Bulletin: W. L. Fawcett of Chicago recently contributed an article to the Tribune of that city on the wheat crop of the United States for the current harvest year. His figures are chiefly based upon the reports of the Agricultural Bureau of the Interior Department. They may be considered, therefore, tolerably reliable. The total acreage for spring and winter wheat for the season Mr. Fawcett estimates at 34,500,000 acres. This is an increase of 4,500,000 over the previous year, or an increase of 14,000,000 acres since 1872. The total yield is set down at 407,000,000 bushels. Of this 249,500,000 bushels are winter sown. The average yield per acre, according to Mr. Fawcett's calculation, is a fraction under twelve bushels. The crop this season is about fifteen per cent. increase over that of last year, when the total estimated yield was 325,000,000 bushels.

Mr. Fawcett proceeds to analyze the crops of the great wheat-producing states. He places California at the head, with 40,000,000 bushels on an acreage of 2,779,000 acres. This gives an average of 14 bushels to the acre, which corresponds with our observation, although it is an open question whether the crop of California is not over estimated. Kansas comes second, with 36,000,000 bushels, 1,900,000 acres. This gives the high average yield of rather more than 18 bushels to the acre. Illinois is accorded the third place, with 32,500,000 bushels. The acreage for that state is set down as 2,324,000. The yield, therefore, averages a little less than 15 bushels to the acre. Minnesota is fourth, with 31,000,000 bushels. Then follow Iowa, Nebraska and the territory of Dakota. The six states and one territory above enumerated it is estimated will produce 50,000,000 more bushels this season than in the last harvest year.

In discussing the probable surplus for export, Mr. Fawcett presents the following figures as the total exports of wheat or its equivalent in flour since 1870:

The yield for 1877 was 328,000,000 bushels. Of this it is estimated 216,000,000 bushels were used for homeconsumption or seed, leaving 100,000,000 bushels in round numbers for exportation. The crop of the current year is estimated at 407,000,000 bushels. Upon the basis of the figures of 1877, the home requirements for food and seed may be set down at 270 million bushels, leaving 140 million bushels for export.

Two hundred English merchantmen are said to be waiting in San Francisco for cargoes of wheat, so that the facilities for foreign shipments of the cereals from that point are unusually fine, and the freight rates low.

A silk farm of 500 acres is to be established in Pennsylvania.

PEN AND SCISSORS.

Revolution is threatened in Grenada. A worm is destroying the turnips in Kiblare, Ireland. A Greek has attempted to assassinate General Todleben.

The silver mine at Ikuno, Japan has petered entirely out. One thousand Philadelphia iron mills men have struck. The San Jose gas company furnish gas at \$1.50 per 1,000 feet.

Oregon grain this year will average 62 to 63 pounds to the bushel.

The Masonic Savings and Loan Bank of San Francisco has failed. Extensive canneries of halibut have been established on the Strait of Fuca.

The coal production of China has already reached 3,000,000 tons annually. The Mikado has opened the new buildings of the Tokio Engineering College.

Each offense of smothering, cutting or boring silver dollars will require a \$1,000 fine. J. L. Smith, of Louisville, claims to have discovered a new element, "icosandrum."

The total product of Mexican mines from 1837 to 1877, is estimated at \$4,067,119,321. A new Russian five per cent. loan of 300,000,000 roubles, issue price 93 cents, is announced.

A human body ticketed from the planet Mars, has been found in an aerolite from Peru. Glass blowers in Wheeling, W. Va., have struck because a man withdrawing from their Union has not been discharged.

A bread-fruit tree has been acclimated in the State Capitol grounds at Sacramento, and is now in healthy bearing. At the University of Oregon free tuition is given one student from each county and one for each member of the Legislature.

Anstro-Hungary may export this year: Wheat 13,000,000 quintals; rye 2,500,000; barley 4,000,000, oats 3,000,000. Deer slaughtering is progressing at such a rate in the northern counties of California as to threaten the extinction of the species.

Work has been unexpectedly suspended for a time on the great Brooklyn bridge. Cause, failure of the two cities to provide funds. Turkey wants England to accept the Cyprian revenue as security for a loan with which to carry on reform.

For a long time the temperature in the Sutro tunnel has been 110°. The stratum is about 1,000 to 1,600 feet deep. During the past year the United States Land Department of California surveyed 157 miles, containing about 3,240 acres, making 361 maps.

The bullion product of the Black Hills for the year 1877, was nearly \$4,000,000, and will not fall short of \$3,000,000 for the present year. The rec very in trade is generally satisfactory, although several commercial centers, notably Manchester and Glasgow, still complain.

At Negaunee, Mich., the works of the Miners' Powder Company exploded Aug. 22, doing terrible execution upon buildings, fences, glass and trees, killing five men.

During the week ending Aug. 20, 54,979 pounds of sulphur and 36,300 pounds of quicksilver were shipped from Calistoga to San Francisco.

An Artesian well on the Norris ranch, Sacramento county, is now down 1,987 feet, and the stratum of soapstone, which has already been bored through 400 feet, still continues.

A Congress of Industry and Commerce met Aug. 20, the President of the Paris Chamber of Commerce being chairman. Delegates from England, the United States, Belgium and Russia were appointed Presidents.

Henry Johnson thinks he has found a meteorite. It will weigh at least 1,800 pounds, is of a dark gray color, oblong in shape, and is smooth and rounded like a boulder. Location, five and a half miles north of Virginia City, Nevada.

Tueson Star: On Wednesday night, Sept. 4, while Marshal Butler was sitting in his own house, with the light burning and the front door open, a Mexican rode up near the door, dismounted from his horse and fired two shots at Butler, neither, however, doing any damage. Butler's shooter was in another room, for which he made lively time and returned as the man was getting in the dark toward the object, and a ball entered the flesh of the horse. The assassin escaped.
