Sunday at the Memphis Cemetery.

The sorrows of the epidemic were never pictured in more distressing scenes than were witnessed last Sunday at Elmwood. Six friends of the late Ed. Worsham had followed his remains to the "city of the dead," for the purpose of paying the last sad tribute to their dearly beloved companion. On arriving at the cemetery, they found the Rev. Dr. White, of Calvary church, who with his aged wife, and faithful colored servant, were the only mourners at the funeral of the minister's son, Eugene D. White, who had died the day previous. On learning that the remains of "poor Ned" were about to be consigned to the grave Dr. White, who is also a Mason, asked the privilege of reading his burial service. The request was readily granted, and the reverend minister, in words most feelingly rendered, amid tears and sobs that almost choked their utterance, eulogized the character of the deceased. As the soil was falling upon the coffin of the deceased Dr. White was approached by a gentleman well known in this community, who asked him to read the services of his dead wife. He was the only mourner, and was heartbroken over his sad loss. The kind old man willingly consented, but first asked that he might consign to the grave his son. The mourners of Ed. Worsham acted as pal-bearers to Eugene D. White, and with uncovered heads listened with aching hearts to the father as he read the service over his dead son. This painful scene had hardly ended when Mr. Ed. Beasley approached and said he would take it as an especial favor if Dr. White would read the funeral service over the remains of the late Wm. Willis, whom a few friends had just brought to his last resting place. Thus it was that the good old man, whose venerable appearance is in keeping with his age, performed the duties of his calling within the short space of half an hour to four departed souls that are now at rest.

Massacre by New Mexico Indians.

The Grant county, New Mexico, Herald, of a late date, says: Nepunceno Acosta, who arrived in Silver City last Monday evening, brings news of a terrible massacre at Puerto del Chocolate, in the state of Chihuahua, Mexico, on the 26th ult. A train heavily loaded with beans, and en route for this place, had just entered the mouth of the canyon, when a large body of Indians fired upon them from an arroyo which the wagons were about to cross. The train men returned the fire, but the Indians were so numerous that the fight was soon over. Every soul connected with the train was killed, Mr. Acosta and a companion reached the scene of the massacre while some of the victims were still in their last agonies. They counted twenty-five bodies, including men, women and children. Puerto del Chocolate is a pass over a spur of the Sierra Madre, nearly a hundred miles south of Janos. Immediately after the discovery, Mr. Acosta and his companions hastened back to Galliana and gave the alarm. A hundred men were soon mounted and started out to pursue the murderers. They followed them into the mountains and came upon them near their rancharia. They found the Indians to be fully five hundred strong and prepared for fight. The Gallina men were compelled to retreat. In returning, they met five Indians on the road, of whom but one escaped. A large company is being organized to pursue and punish the red devils.

New Ruling in Mining Claims.

A Washington dispatch, dated October 24th, states the commissioner of the general land office, in deciding the matter of the Hope Mining company's application for a patent for the Potosi lode, announces the new and important ruling in regard to the width of all lode claims. Referring to section 2,310 of the revised statutes, which provides that no claims shall extend more than three hundred feet on each side of the vein at the surface, says: "When the vein outcrops at the surface, there can be no question as to the point from which the lateral measurement must begin, but when the discovery shaft develops this vein at some distance below the surface, and the locator does not determine further, by prospecting, that the nearest actual surface point is elsewhere, and the fact does not otherwise appear, I am of the opinion that the point of the vein so discovered must be assumed to be the middle of the vein, and the lateral measurement must be calculated therefrom. The law is mandatory and contemplates that but 300 feet shall be taken on either side of the vein, and compliance with the law necessitates the fixing of a point from which these measurements begin. I think the rule above indicated is the only one practicable in this case, the width of the claim on one side being more than 300 feet from the discovery opening."
