Hundreds of people are arriving here daily from the south to escape the draft, and state that everything is in the wildest confusion in Sonora, owing to the revolution, and fears are entertained that there will be serious trouble for some time.

It is stated that the Mexican gov desires to connect the Atlantic and Pacific coasts by a railroad from Tampico to San Blas, and is disposed to give a liberal subsidy in aid of the undertaking. At the Mexican capital General Frisbie is about to establish a bank which will be conducted on a broad and progressive basis. It is likewise contemplated to organize a transportation company, which shall undertake banking operations and enable manufacturers in the United States to transact business with safety and dispatch in the Mexican republic. It is likewise proposed to build an international railroad, which, beginning at the terminus of the Great Northern railroad at Austin, Texas, would pass through Laredo, Saltillo and San Luis and terminate at the Mexican capital. An able document in support of this project has been published, and 5,000 copies thereof will be circulated in Mexico during the stay of the deputation.

In accordance with an act of the Legislative Assembly of Arizona Territory, and the Proclamation of the Governor issued thereunder, a

LOTTERY!

Will be drawn at Prescott, A. T., on Wednesday, June 4th, 1879.

Act of the Legislature.

An act to aid in the construction of Capital Buildings, and for the support of Public Schools in the Territory of Arizona.

Be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of Arizona Territory:

Section 1. It shall be lawful for, and the right power and authority is hereby granted for the period of twenty years, from the 1st day of February, 1879, to the Arizona Development Company, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the Territory of Arizona, and its assigns, to give public lotteries at which, or by means of which money may be lawfully disposed of by chance, anything in the laws of this Territory to the contrary notwithstanding, etc., etc.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the Territory of Arizona, and his successor in office, and in the event of his absence, disqualification, or death of the Governor, his legal substitute, is hereby appointed a Commissioner to supervise the drawing or distribution of prizes in said lotteries, and each of them, and certify to the correctness thereof, etc., etc.

Sec. 3. All lotteries drawn under the provisions of this act, shall be drawn in some public place to be designated by the Commissioner, between the hours of ten o'clock a. m. and five o'clock p. m., and in a manner to be approved by the Commissioner.

Sections 4, 5 and 6 provide for the collection of ten per cent. from all prizes and the payment of the same into the capital and school funds.

Certificate of Territorial Treasurer.

I, Thomas J. Butler, Treasurer of Arizona Territory, hereby certify that the Arizona Development Company has this day filed in my office its certificate in writing of the act of which the above is a copy, and has also filed in my office a bond in the sum of twenty thousand dollars, which bond has been approved by the Governor and an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Arizona Territory, conditioned as to its faithful performance of the provisions of said act.

Proclamation of the Governor.

TERMINUS OF ARIZONA, EXECUTIVE DEPT., February 20, 1879.

I, John C. Fremont, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, and specific Commissioner to supervise the drawing of lotteries for the support of the public school's use, by virtue of the power and authority vested in me by law, do hereby designate as the place where the first lottery shall be drawn by the Arizona Development Company, the Theatre in Prescott, the Capital of said Territory of Arizona, and the time when the same shall be drawn shall be the 4th day of June, 1879, between the hours of 10 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock p. m.
