# CONCERNS OF THE DISTRICT

## October Report of Dr. Godding, of Government Hospital for Insane.

### ADDED STREET LETTER-BOXES

#### Fireman Fraser Dropped from the Rolls for Desertion—Conference Concerning Electric Street Lighting—Condition of Funds Stops the Laying of New Water Mains.

Superintendent Goddings, of the Government Hospital for the Insane, reports thirteen admissions of patients to the institution during the month of October, of whom nine were white and four colored. One white and one colored of the thirteen were readmissions, the patients having been absent on leave to visit. Eight of the total number were males and five females.

There were eighteen dismissions, including eight deaths. One of the deaths was due to accidental drowning, the name of the patient being Henry E. Gross, a white man. The eighteen were equally divided between the races, while five of the deaths were of the Caucasian race.

Postmaster Sherwood recently asked of the Commissioners permission to erect posts upon which to attach letter-boxes at the following points:

In front of 931 D street, No. 608 Thirteenth street, No. 613 Seventh street, southwest corner of Fourth and I streets, northwest corner of Fifth and F streets, northwest corner of Eleventh and E streets, and northeast corner of Thirtieth and M streets, all in the northwest section of the city.

The papers were returned yesterday with the recommendation by Capt. Fiebigler that permission be granted for each point where there is no lamp-post convenient to which the letter-box can be suspended. This recommendation has Commissioner Powell's favorable endorsement.

The Commissioners have approved the suggestion that a special officer be assigned from the fire department for duty at the Convention Hall during the continuance of the food exposition, and Chief Harris will detail a man for that service, beginning tomorrow.

Orville Fraser having deserted his company at box 142, on the occasion of the fire on the evening of the 26th instant, Chief Harris recommends that he be dropped from the rolls and that Archibald Nelson be appointed to succeed him, appointment to date from the 10th instant.

Capt. E. S. Randall applied recently to the Commissioners for permission to obtain two hundred shade trees from the nursery to be set out at River View, the transplanting to be at his own expense. While there is a surplus of trees at the nursery, the chairman of the parking commission doubts the wisdom of donating them for transplanting outside of the District, and this view is endorsed by Capt. Fiebigler and sustained by Commissioner Powell.

Orders issued yesterday: That the following work be done under the provisions of law governing assessment and permit work.

Lay granite sidewalks on First street northwest, both sides, from R to P street; on P street northwest, north side, between Seventeenth and Nineteenth streets, except in front of Nos. 1751, 1759, 1763 and 1765, on Thirtieth street, Georgetown, west side, from M street to a point about 150 feet north of Prospect street; on Thirtieth street, Georgetown, east side, from M street northwest about 400 feet.

Lay asphalt sidewalk on P street northwest, south side, between Seventh and Eighteenth streets, in front of lots 73 to 78.


