WILLED AWAY HIS PROPERTY.

Dr. Baldwin Deeded It to His Wife and She Gave It to Others.

A few weeks ago Dr. Aaron Baldwin filed a suit in equity to secure himself in possession of property left by his wife, Leah Gray Baldwin. He said they had made an agreement by which their real estate was to be in her name, but she was to make a will giving all to him.

She did this, but subsequently, while visiting her brother and sister, made another will. Mrs. Baldwin died during the past summer, and yesterday Dr. Baldwin filed the two wills, and asked that the first, which was made on January 9, 1892, be admitted to probate. This gives him all her property, consisting of No. 1235 Eleventh street, twenty-one acres of land in the Equitable Life Assurance Society, real estate in Mount Pleasant, and her furniture, jewelry, etc.

The second will, made at Seattle, Wash., gives to her sister, Jennie E. Shay, a \$5,000 interest in the Mount Pleasant property, and an interest in the other property to her sister and brother, and her jewelry to her niece. She expresses a hope that this will seem fair and be satisfactory to her husband, and she makes him executor without bond, as she had done in the first case.

The second will has only two witnesses, and hence cannot convey real estate in this District.

MR. BIRNEY INTENDS TO WIN

District Attorney Confident He Has a Good Case Against Howgate.

ARGUMENTS ON DEMURRERS

Attorney Worthington, for the Defense, contends That the Indictments are Defective in Several Material Points—Counsel for the Government Declare Their Validity.

Capt. Henry W. Howgate, charged with stealing for himself government money while disbursing office in the signal service thirteen years ago, was before Judge McComas yesterday for a hearing upon the objections of his counsel to the indictments found against him at that time. Not over twenty-five persons outside court employes were present and most of those were lawyers.

Capt. Howgate appeared to be in good spirits and in fair health despite his confinement. He was thoroughly alert and whispered occasionally with his counsel, A. S. Worthington. He is evidently quite hopeful that no case can be made against him, as was pointed out by THE TIMES when the demurrers were first filed.

The present indictments were then believed to be defective, for the reasons given, and the attempt to obtain new indictments, as was stated, was attended with difficulties, while a conviction would hardly be possible. The reason for this, as stated, was the lack of evidence occasioned by death and removal of witnesses and loss of papers. The disappearance of papers from the Treasury and ex-Chief Drummond's denial that they had disappeared in connection with his leaving the service were even then ancient history.

In the argument yesterday Mr. Worthington urged, as the demurrer states, that the indictments fail in several particulars, and that the money was to the injury of the government. The statements were not sufficiently definite to acquit the defendant with the special officers, and that the indictments contained nothing more certain in law than that a prisoner had a right to know exactly and fully the charges against him. The drawer of the indictment failed to contain anything himself with making the charge in the words of the statute. In support he quoted decisions of the United States Supreme Court.

At considerable length the illustrations of how a government officer might use government money technically for himself and without intent to cause loss and without loss to the people, were given. The essence of the charge intended, and yet it was not charged, nor could it be inferred from the language used.

Furthermore, the indictments failed to describe the funds which it was alleged Howgate misappropriated. Such a description was invariably required in the courts here, and there was no reason to change the rule in this case.

Finally there was no charge that Capt. Howgate was a discharging officer of the United States. For these reasons the indictments for embezzlement ought to be thrown out. In the forger cases he gave the additional reason that the indictments failed to describe the papers forged.

In concluding Mr. Worthington stated that the defective papers were drawn at a time when special counsel was always employed by the Department of Justice for such cases, and as in the Star Route cases, so in this case, the custom resulted in failure.

W. M. Lewis replied for the government that the cases cited by Mr. Worthington in support of his assertions were quite different from the present. Such offices as Howgate's, he said, were made a special class by Congress. The government could not be bound by precedents in ordinary cases. He read the statute and pointed out the differences of this case from the cases cited by Mr. Worthington.

Mr. Birney closed the case for the government by reading very numerous authorities in support of the validity of the indictments. He asked Mr. Worthington to produce a single authority which holds that the method of embezzlement must be particularly set forth, as he had asserted in the United States Supreme Court and State cases with reference to the extent to which an indictment must go into detail, and argued that they made it clear that the prosecution could not be called on to state its whole case and negative the defense in the presentation of its indictment.

It has been intimated by many that Mr. Birney places reliance upon the indictments argued yesterday, but the care and labor bestowed upon the preparation of the defense of them gives no indication of this. Mr. Worthington will close for the defense on Monday.

Witnesses have already been summoned in order to secure new indictments, and other material has been gathered up. It would be found. It is stated that hearing of witnesses began before the grand jury yesterday. There was gossip yesterday that if the papers at the Treasury which were misused some weeks ago, could not be found, as they have not yet been, the case against Howgate would completely break down.

"The Times can say for me," said Mr. Birney yesterday, "that this is not at all true. A conviction can be secured without them as well as with them. All I want to know is either that they have been found or that they cannot be found. I think we have a good case and shall win it."

BIDS FOR THE BONDS.

They Were Opened Yesterday and Were Eminently Satisfactory to Secretary Carlisle—Low Rate of Interest.

The bids for the \$20,000,000 bond issue recently offered by Secretary Carlisle were opened at the Treasury Department yesterday shortly before 1 o'clock. At 4 o'clock it was stated at the department that a hurried calculation showed that the total number of separate bids was 277, aggregating \$154,370,350.

The largest bid was the syndicate bid of the United States Trust Company, Drexel, Morgan & Co., and others, which was for the whole amount or none. This bid was the best offered, as the aggregate of bids above this figure was only about \$10,324,120, leaving about \$136,046,230 at issue figured. It therefore seems quite probable that the syndicate bid will be accepted, although Secretary Carlisle stated that he could not express an opinion as to the result until next Monday, when the awards will be made.

According to the terms of this bid the government will pay 2 1/2 per cent. on the \$20,000,000, as against 3 per cent. carried by the February issue. There is a possibility, however, that a close calculation will disclose the fact that there is a sufficient number of bids as a better rate than this, which, with the second syndicate bid at 1 1/2, 2,890 per cent., may make a combination slightly more advantageous to the government than the other, although this is very improbable.

Although the result of the bids is preliminarily satisfactory to the Treasury officials, as is shown that not only was there a brisk rivalry for the bonds, but the interest demanded was even lower than was generally expected. At no time during the pendency of the issue has Secretary Carlisle doubted that it would all be eagerly taken and at satisfactory rates.
