SHALL THE STATE LICENSE THE SALOON. Presbyterian Ministers' Association Discuss This Question.

Think It Were Better There Should Be No Restriction At All. The Majority, However, Rather Favored a Well Regulated and Rigidly Enforced License System Instead of Rigid Prohibitory Laws or No Interference At All on the Part of the Authorities—Reform Sought.

Dr. Lucock took the position that under no circumstance did the State have the moral right to license the sale of liquors. After the reading of the paper the question was thrown open for general discussion, when the whole subject of the sale of intoxicating liquors was considered in all its bearings.

Another prominent minister took the position that the use of the word "license" did not really express the position of the government towards the saloons. Without a so-called license law the sale of alcoholic liquors would naturally be as free and as unrestricted as that of sugar.

Seely Will Spend Eight Years in the Kings County Penitentiary. New York, Dec. 24.—Samuel C. Seely, who on Monday last pleaded guilty to the charge of abstracting funds and altering the books of the National Shoe and Leather Bank, was today sentenced to eight years imprisonment in Kings County Penitentiary by Judge Benedict in the United States circuit court.

Debs' Sentence. Chicago, Dec. 24.—Judge Woods today decided that the jail sentence for Debs and his six associates in the Santa Fe case should begin January 8. On motion of Attorney Gregory for the defense in the Santa Fe government cases, on which the sentence was cumulative, they were separated and sentenced to the Federal reformatory at Joliet, Ill.

Twelve Were Drowned. Copenhagen, Dec. 24.—The Norwegian steamer Stanley, from Eupatoria for Calmar, was wrecked Saturday morning off Dunbjerg. Twelve of the crew were drowned, after being exposed in an open boat for twenty-four hours, the boat having capsized. One of those who were thrown into the water by the overturning of the boat saved himself by swimming ashore.
