OUR RESIDENT PET ARISTOCRACY

Favorite High-bred Animals Beloved by Many of Washington's Best People.

While there are many people who have an aversion to an animal about the house, there are few homes that do not boast of a cat or a dog, and those of our officials at the Capital are no exception, for there is scarcely a house of a prominent man in town that has not some sort of a pet, especially if there are children to brighten the household. From the White House to the humblest cabin in the city there is some sort of a creature on whom superfluous affection is lavished, and mixed, with her white, beribboned poodle, finds a sincere imitator in the washerwoman whose slattern heels are closely followed by a bow-legged, ill-natured yellow cur with no manners and still less pedigree of which he can boast.

The family of the President has been the recipients of many presents from people all over the land who are always sending some queer thing to the White House and it is a common occurrence for the express wagon to bring to the mansion a case that has traveled hundreds of miles to reach Mrs. Cleveland. Generally it is a dog, and only a short while ago Mrs. Cleveland gave to one of the children of the Rev. Mackay-Smith, rector of the fashionable Church of St. John, a beautiful collie dog, probably the one about whose escape a year ago such a time was made in the newspapers. The only pets that the mistress of the White House has are two fine mockingbirds and a little canary. Thelietri has

Though she is not a Mexican, being a native of Philadelphia, she has a fondness for the beautiful things of her adopted country, for in such a light does she regard our sister republic in the South.

Secretary Hoke Smith is a lover of fine horse flesh and keeps a big bay on which he takes a daily morning ride. His boy, Marion, a fine lad of about twelve years old, is a good rider, and trots along beside his father on a tiny mouse-colored pony no larger than a good-sized Newfoundland dog. Of course, the pony is a great pet with the family and is much beloved by the little children. Marion has a tiny cart, and he drives out frequently, but the negro servant always accompanies him on his travels.

Mr. Hogenmuller, the recently appointed Minister from Austria, is a connoisseur in birds and is especially fond of those capital is the immense English mastiff, which is the property of the family of the late Secretary Blaine. He is a fine, noble fellow, of a tan color, almost as large as a calf. Miss Lydia Biddle possesses what is probably one of the finest dogs in the city, if not in the country. It is a large Newfoundland from the Philadelphia kennels, pure blooded and would bring a large sum if placed on the market.

Mr. Romero has a fine parrot that is the pet of the household. Once it got away and there was a great time among the street boys to catch it for its mistress. It is a brightly colored one, and can speak French and Spanish fluently. The family of the chief justice also have a parrot, and it has been for some days under the care of a doctor. A few days ago the carriage of the justice drove up to a bird store, and he alighted to see the sick bird and tried to make the little thing recognize its master. It was an odd sight to see the dignity of our most solemn bench of law so unbend as to talk pettiness to a bird.

Taken altogether the trade in pets has reached quite large proportions, and there is always a good demand among Washingtonians for small but curious animals from every clime. 
