FEDERATION OF LABOR. Representatives from twenty-nine local labor organizations put in an appearance at the regular weekly meeting of the Federation of Labor last Tuesday evening.

President James F. Hugh was in the chair and called the meeting to order promptly at 8 o'clock.

Under the head of credentials those of Peter Keyes in place of C. C. Bolter, from the Eclectic Association of Steam Engineers, and of Francis Starny, from the Bakers and Confectioners' Union, were read and accepted. Credentials from the Musical Protective Association were referred to a committee.

Under the new constitution the applications of organizations whose names were not on the list were read and accepted. In view of the fact that the organization to which the credentials had been referred did not report favorably on the admission of the applying organization, the matter should be placed in the hands of a committee of nine delegates, whose duty it would be to report on the matter to both sides and to report conclusions back to the Federation.

The Barbers' Assembly having made no report in the case of Mr. Bolter, the committee to whom the case of Mr. B. Salomon was referred reported that, in conjunction with the executive board of the District Assembly, an interview with Mr. Salomon was had with the result that an agreement was reached in which all work done by him in the future should be given to employers of strictly union labor. The committee recommended that Mr. Salomon be referred to the Knights of Labor from the District Assembly that the agreement was satisfactory and that body and requested that the Executive Council in the action of the District in taking the name of the unfair list.

The delegates from the Carpenters' Union requested that the matter be referred to that union before final action was taken, which request was granted.

The committee to whom the request of the painter's union was referred reported that it had investigated and found that the work had been done by union labor, therefore the committee recommended that the request be granted, which request was accepted.

Delegates reported that the ice wagon drivers of the Great Falls Ice Company were desirous of connecting themselves with organized labor, and to this end would, if permitted, take out a charter under the Knights of Labor. As the company for the first time was working on the unfair list they were placed in a rather peculiar position. It was further stated that this movement on the part of the men was in conformity with the suggestion of the president of the company, who had encouraged them to organize and had given them assurance of his support. As it was ascertained that the Great Falls Ice Company was placed on the unfair list by recommendation of the carpenters, the matter was referred to them for their action.

Electric Workers reported that the electric machinists and engineering work in the Evening News office was being done by non-union men. The complaint must be presented in writing by the organization making the complaint, the matter could not be entertained until the constitution had been complied with.

The secretary stated that he had in his possession a quantity of garden seed that had been given him for distribution among the delegates of the various organizations, which could be had on application. If not disposed of during the week he would have the balance at the end of the next meeting.

The question of Although's Opera House being on the unfair list, was, at the request of several delegates, taken up. The secretary stated that a number of delegates was called by placing the opera house on the unfair list they were in honor bound not to attend, which was denying them and their families a great pleasure. The delegates further stated that they had in the past been frequent visitors to that theater, and had always been repaid for their visit. On motion, the secretary was instructed to communicate with the manager, Mr. Allen, and ask whether the theater would be willing to make a reasonable settlement could not be made.

DISTRICT ASSEMBLY. Promptly at 8 o'clock Master Workman W. H. G. Simmons called the meeting of the District Assembly of the Knights of Labor to order last Thursday evening.

With the exception of two organizations every local was represented.

Annual Inspection and Muster

The annual inspection and muster has begun. The new inspector general, Major Winthrop Alexander, assisted by Capt. Horton, of the brigade staff, and Capt. Jenkins, of Company A, Fifth Battalion, are the inspecting officers. There will be busy times from now on until the trouble is all over.

The brigade staff was inspected first at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening. Gen. Ordway, for the first time in the history of the guard, was absent. It was impossible for him to be present, as he was on his way to the front. At 8:15 the staff of the First Regiment was inspected. Only the hospital steward was absent, and he was excused on account of illness.

The inspection this year are attracting a great deal of attention, and on the returns depend the fate of several companies, especially in the Second Regiment, Company C, Second Battalion, will be inspected to-morrow, instead of Monday, the 13th, as at first intended. The third separate company has been ordered for inspection Monday, May 13.

THE FIRST INSPECTION. The First Battalion was inspected at 8:45 p. m. Wednesday in their armory. Two hundred and forty officers and men were present. The quarters were very confined and the battalion was much crowded. The inspection was made by the major and adjutant, and it is said that, from this point of view, it was one of the best ever seen in the District.
