## WE CHOSE A SECRETARY

Col. Truesdell's Assistant is a Son of Chief Justice Alvey.

### MR. ROSS WILL APPOINT ONE

Nelson, Morris & Co., Must Remove Their Gas Engine Get the Consent of Property Owners—Record of Deaths—Bids for Laying Sewers on Various Streets.

Commissioner Truesdell yesterday designated T. Fred Alvey, a son of Chief Justice Alvey, of the District court of appeals, as his private secretary. The appointment will take effect July 1, the position having been created at the last session of Congress. Commissioner Ross will also have to choose a secretary, and will doubtless announce his selection upon his return from Pittsburgh.

Nelson Morris & Co., whose establishment is at No. 627 B street northwest, have been notified that their gas engine at that number has been located at No. 628 Pennsylvania avenue. The records of the attorney for the District they will either have to discontinue its use or obtain the consent of all property owners within ninety feet for operating it. The engine was the alleged source of great annoyance to the occupants of a boarding-house located at No. 628 Pennsylvania avenue.

John Farwell, who is a stall-holder in the Eastern Market, and not long since tried and convicted in the police court for the sale of a chicken that had died a natural death, was before the Commissioners yesterday, with his attorney, to argue his non-liability for the offense. ### NOT TO TEST THE LAW.

Warrant Issued to Make Street Car Companies Put on Safety Fenders. Assistant Attorney for the District James L. Pugh issued warrants yesterday against the Washington and Georgetown Railroad Company, the Brightwood Railroad Company, the Columbia Railroad Company, and the Georgetown and Tenallytown Railroad Company, charging them with operating cars without fenders and wheel guards, as required by order of the Commissioners. Each of the four boxes of the railroad companies for running cars without the required license of \$6 for each car. The representatives of the various roads were notified to appear in the police court to-day with their attorneys to answer to the charges. Mr. Pugh said yesterday that warrants will be issued every day until the railroad companies comply with the law. The prosecutions, he said, are not brought for the purpose of testing the law, but to enforce its provisions.

Also Threatened to Punch Joseph Fink's Jaw and Gliblets. Frederick J. Chism, an ice man, answered in the police court yesterday a charge of threats against Joseph J. Fink, of Massachusetts avenue. Fink testified that Chism came to his residence a couple of days ago and demanded payment of a bill. Upon being told he could not pay he demanded to see Chism. Chism uttered the most blood curdling oaths and threatened to punch his jaw and gliblets into the street. Judge Kimball asked the defendant if he meant to really harm Fink. "If I ever meet him on the outside we'll see who's the best man," Chism answered. "You will give \$100 bonds," remarked his honor, "or go to the workhouse for a month."
