NO AWNINGS SAYS SAYLOR

Conductors on W. & G. Cable Cars May Roast or Broil.

HAS HEARD NO COMPLAINTS

Metropolitan Line Has Them, but the Men, Themselves, Have to Pay for the Canvas—Columbia Properly Equipped in Short Time—Tennallytown Motorman Don't Want Them.

There will be no awnings on the Washington and Georgetown cable cars this summer if Supt. Saylor's present mood on that subject is to continue throughout the season. As a consequence, the car conductors will get the sun in the neck and in the back all through the roasting July and August days.

The gripmen are all right. They are not kicking, nor are the conductors kicking for publication, but they are doing a good deal of thinking, and especially when the sun is curling the wool on their blue jackets.

At the Georgetown terminus yesterday afternoon there was some decided talk about this matter, and there was no difference of opinion that the awnings were badly needed on the rear cars. It is a case of suffering, said one of the men, with whom all agreed, and he said to The Times that any man, woman or child who sat even on the back seats of the cars when the sun streams ought to know the feeling of a conductor whose duty it is to retire to the rear car platform and stand right square up in the sun after he has collected a fare. The men thought that it would be to the advantage of the company to have these awnings for the public, if not for the conductors.

SAYLOR WAS SURPRISED. Superintendent Saylor was called on and asked if anything in this line was contemplated by the company. Mr. Saylor was much surprised at the complaint. It was the first he had heard, he said. Why, he continued, the cable cars are very cool places and the exposure of the conductors is not to be compared with that of men who have to make a living working directly out in the sun. He stated that he had heard complaints of this kind, he said, and so far as his experience went it was people who minded their own business who got along best in this world.

This was asserted to, as The Times and the superintendent were both engaged in that very quality of business during this interval. Mr. Saylor said that he had intended to put up any awnings and that they were not wanted.

The cable car conductors were then asked if the absence of the awning was such a grievance as they had stated, why they had not called it to the attention of the railway authorities. The answer was that they did not intend to hazard their positions by taking the company to task for their exposure to the sun.

The Metropolitan line and the heretofore have acted awnings, the former front and rear, and the Columbia men will soon be gratified with piazzas front and rear on their handsome blue rolling palaces.

COLUMBIA HAS ALL RIGHT. President Baker said yesterday that two of the cars had been so equipped during the last two days of the past week. There had been some little delay in getting the iron part of the equipment for the awning, but that was all. They would all be furnished within a reasonable time.

On the Georgetown and Tennallytown Railroad the men said that they did not want any awnings. At least the crews of three successive cars said so as they rolled into Georgetown.

There was no exception among the Avenue cable car men. They all said that the awnings would be very desirable.

On the Metropolitan line, according to the statement of the conductors, there was a very small piece of business done by the officials. The awning concession, they say, was due to the big strike of last winter. They are not permitted to receive, but they must pay for them out of their own pockets. The company furnishes the iron bar, to which the cloth is attached, but the men do all the rest. They would all be glad, if they were asked, Oh, only 30 cents for each awning, but it is such a small matter that it looks much smaller for the company not to have paid for them.

NO TICKET, NO SHIRT.

No. 1149, yesterday afternoon at 609 F street northwest, officers of the assembly for the next six months were nominated and resolutions passed condemning the action of Mr. Eugene Kerman, who in his contract for the erection of additional buildings, stipulated that no union workmen should be employed.

"There is now a boycott on Kerman's Theater and to strengthen the boycott another resolution was adopted to the effect that any member who violated the order of the boycott by visiting the theater as spectator, should be fined for each offense \$5.
