> The Establishment of Six New Com panies Desired-Expenses Aggregating \$570,260-Many Betterments for the Department Proposed.

Robert W. Dutton, Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, yesterday submitted to the Commissioners his schedule of esti-mates for the fiscal year ending June 30. 1960. Mr. Dutton estimates the total ex-pense of the department for that year, including the establishment of six new companier, at \$570,200. This, he says, is an excess over the expenditure of the present fiscal year of \$24,346, the differ-ence being that of the total estimates submitted and the amount provided in ap-propriations for the current year. The es-timates add something to all salaries of the department and thirty-four new pri-vates of the second class are provided r. With reference to the schedule, Mr. itton says:

"The largest item of increase, \$120,000 presents the sites, houses, and furniture for the six new companies and the school of instruction. The site, house, and furniture of one of these, that at Congress Heights, have already been provid-ed for, and only the apparatus and men or that one remain to be secured. These additional companies are badly needed. In fact, the District Fire Department is just about half the size it should be. The department covers a territory of sixtynine square miles, and, counting the Brookland company, which will be estabdistrict to be covered by it of 2.87% square niles, almost double that covered by a mpany in New York and Philadelphia hree times greater than a company's ter ritory in Baltimore, Buffalo, Cincinnati, or New Orleans; four times larger than those of Milwaukee and Louisville com-panies; about six times more extensive than the districts covered by a San Frandisco company, and about seven times creater than a Boston company covers.

"Of the additional companies asked for the one most badly needed is the truck company proposed to be located in the southeastern section of the city. In all this section there is but one truck com pany, Truck A, located on North Capitol Street between B and C. In this part of he city and Distric; are located St. Eliza-eth's Insane Asylum, Providence Hospital, the Naval Hospital, the German Or-phan Asylum, jall, and many public chools, all dependent upon a single truck mpany on a first alarm.

The next company in point of desirabil-

ity is an engine company in the south-western section of the city, in which section, despite its extensive territory and the presence therein of many valuable structures, there is but one engine com pany located. There should be another es-tablished in this portion of the city at the


