GOING AROUND CAPE HORN.

Naval Tur Will Make a Voyage of Over 14,000 Miles.

A voyage of over 14,000 miles is the prospect before the officers and crew of the ocean-going tug, the "Tur," which is being sent to the Navy Department. The vessel will shortly leave the Charleston Navy Yard, near Boston, and steam around Cape Horn for Seattle, Wash. The voyage will be the longest ever made by a tug. She is one of the largest tugs attached to the fleet, and also rates close to the largest in the country. She is now out of commission and awaiting repairs.

STEEL TIGER TRAPS.

Safe and Sure Methods Used by Natives.

Capturing tigers by new methods is now being adopted in Sumatra and is proving almost invariably successful. As soon as a tiger's lair has been found natives are employed to construct a wooden fence, five feet long and four feet wide, at a short distance from the tiger's enclosure. It is then placed as a bait dog, which is tied to one of the fence posts. A narrow entrance leads into the enclosure, and there, deftly concealed under earth, lies a trap. When the tiger enters the trap, which is placed in the enclosure, he cannot free himself from such bondage, and as those who have set the trap are hidden, the tiger is not aware of the time he is released, and, indeed, he is not aware of the fact that he is being captured. This is the method used by the natives, and it is a safe and sure method.
