

LIQUIDATION READILY MET

The Market Develops Unexpected Power of Absorption.

Despite Much Selling, Causing Hesitancy and Reactions, a Strong Undertone Is Shown—The Rail-way List Monopoles Attention.

NEW YORK, Aug. 26.—Today's stock market could be best understood along with the technical side, because except for the improving aspects of the steel strike situation—nothing that was new was presented for consideration upon the opening of business. The steel strike situation did, indeed, show a most pronounced betterment, and from current indications it would not appear improbable that a conclusion of the whole difficulty might be arranged during the current week.

London did not accept the full measure of the advances scored in this market on Saturday, when business was suspended at that point, although a general firm tone was reported as prevailing in the securities market there, notwithstanding the somewhat disappointing attitude of London, however, the local market opened active and almost buoyant, with decided animation appearing in every quarter.

From the beginning of trading it was evident that profit realizing sales were being conducted in tremendous volume. Occasionally the liquidation of this account led to halting tendencies and somewhat substantial reactions, but the undertone of the dealings continued distinctly firm and the market again disclosed an unexpected power of absorption. Western houses were heavy buyers of securities, and the London market's failure of the advance made here on Saturday, foreign houses on balance were buyers of a fair amount of stocks.

Apart from the betwixt in the steel strike, the day's new business on particular stocks was limited to the large number of railway traffic returns submitted for the third week of the month, which made very gratifying showings. Money on call was firm and there was no material alteration in sterling exchange.

The railway list again furnished the most noteworthy movements in the day's market. Notably strong features there were Southern Railway, Union Pacific, Southern Railway, common and preferred; the Erie issues, and the anthracite coal stocks generally. Other firm features were Norfolk and Western, Pennsylvania, and the Washingtons, in none of these instances was it possible to cite any particularly novel factors instrumental in the course followed.

Little was done among the industrials, apart from the steel issues, but a firm tone prevailed there also. There was increasing animation appearing in the activity of the market, particularly in the shares of the Southern Railway and the other companies. It is understood that with the settlement of the Amalgamated Association efforts will be undertaken to consolidate, or at any rate to reorganize, the various iron and steel companies operating in the Birmingham neighborhood.
