MOLINEUX IN THE TOMBS.

Accompanied by His Father, He Leaves Sing Sing Prison.

The Prisoner in Good Health, but Very Pale From His Long Confinement—Good Wishes Extended by People at the Railway Stations.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—Holand R. Molineux is in the Tombs again, awaiting trial for the murder of Mrs. Katherine J. Adams. He was brought back from Sing Sing this afternoon on an order signed by Judge McMahon in the Court of General Sessions and today in the cell 35 of the second tier of the Tombs, the cell occupied when he was in the Tombs before. Gen. E. L. Molineux and George Gordon Battle accompanied him from Sing Sing. The prisoner's mother, who was in custody, was not apprised of her son's departure for New York. It is probable that she will be here tomorrow and see him face to face with no bars between them, as this has not been since he was taken to Sing Sing. Sing Sing death sentence on February 16, 1900. Molineux is in good health, but his face is so white as to be ghastly, owing to his long confinement.

SURGEONS' REPORT READY.

Summary of the Statement by Mr. McKimley's Physicians.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—A summary of the report of the surgeons who attended the late President McKinley was given out for publication today by the "Medical Journal," which will print the report tomorrow as the official record in the case. The report is signed by Dr. Harvey R. Gaylord, pathologist to the State Pathological Laboratories, Dr. Gaylord says that the search for the bullet was most thorough and painstaking, but in spite of all efforts it could not be found. The autopsy had to be discontinued because the time allotted to it by the family of the late President had already been exceeded. Dr. Gaylord adds: "As we were satisfied that nothing could be gained by locating the bullet, which had set up no reaction, search for it was discontinued."

BANK MESSENGER MISSING.

His Wallet Returned, Minus a Large Sum in Cash.

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—George Armitage, a messenger in the employ of the New Amsterdam National Bank, at Broadway and Thirty-ninth Street, left the bank on Tuesday morning to collect a job of checks and drafts. He usually finished his round and returned to the bank by 4 o'clock in the afternoon. On Tuesday he failed to return and now the police are looking for him. The bank's officers express a fear that he has met with foul play. The police do not seem to believe anything of the kind.

FIGHT OPENED IN RICHMOND.

A Democratic Mass Meeting in the Academy of Music.

RICHMOND, Va., Oct. 17.—The Democratic gubernatorial campaign opened in Richmond tonight with a large and enthusiastic meeting in the Academy of Music. Several hundred delegates were present. Chairman Kilgus, of the State Democratic Committee, presided and first thanked the delegates. He then made a strong speech in which he paid a high tribute to the convention and reiterated the Democratic position in Virginia and the suffrage question. He was followed by Attorney General Montague, the Democratic candidate for Governor, who dealt chiefly with State issues. Chairman Kilgus, in his introductory speech, said: "The overwhelming consideration which should be in the minds of the men of the convention was the desire to be rid of the ever present menace of negro misrule in Virginia. The convention was overwhelmingly Democratic, and it is a rigid accountability for its acts. The best men of this Commonwealth have been selected as the representatives of their constituents, for every Democrat in this Commonwealth has been held for the desire of the white people of this Commonwealth to have a government of legislative provisions as would take away from the negro the right to vote, and at the same time to deprive the negro of his right to vote, but in order to devise a plan for the removal of the negro from the white man his right of suffrage."

SUB-TREASURIES OPPOSED.

Ex-Comptroller Eckels Declares the Present System a Menace.

Before the American Bankers' Association in Milwaukee He Advocates Radical Changes—Cries of "No!" "No!" Greet His Statements.

MILWAUKEE, Oct. 17.—Ex-Comptroller James H. Eckels, in a speech before the American Bankers' Convention today, advocated the abolition of the sub-treasury system. His speech caused quite a stir, he being several times interrupted with questions and shouts of "No, no." After the address President Randolph, of the Atlantic Trust Company of New York, got up and said it was a wild system that Mr. Eckels advocated. Mr. Eckels said in part: "I agree with the Secretary of the Treasury that the financial and economic system of this country has not reached the development which a people of so much progress have a right to expect. It is faulty largely because of circumstances and not because of a desire on the part of the people to have a faulty system. I would like much to see the legal tender system of this country not only improved, but canceled and retired, because until they are removed permanently from the monetary system of the country there is always a possibility of their return in a form that will be dangerous to the financial and monetary interests of the country."

THE MCKINLEY MEMORIAL ARCH.

Executive Committee Decides to Incorporate the Association.

The executive committee of the National McKinley Memorial Arch Association met yesterday afternoon in the directors' room of the American Security and Trust Company, Charles J. Bell presiding. All the members of the committee were present. It was decided at once to proceed to incorporate the Memorial Arch Association, and a committee composed of John Joy Edson, Beriah Wilkins, and Mitchell G. Dyrenforth was appointed to arrange the details of the incorporation. There was a full and free discussion of the general subject of the association and the best means to bring about a result which would meet the view of the American people in raising a proper memorial in honor of President McKinley. Mr. Edson, Mr. Foster, B. F. Macfarland, and Thomas F. Walsh were appointed a committee to outline a general plan of procedure.

TWO POINTS FOR SCHLEY.

The Department's Case Badly Shattered by Testimony.

Ensign Macy Says the Commander of the Flying Squadron Intended the Attack on the Colon to Be Merely a Reconnoissance—He Joked to Endanger His Ship—Sigsbee Did Not Think Cervera Was at Santiago, According to Ensign Macy—Additional Commendation of the Marylander's Bearing in Battle.

Two steel projectiles pierced the vulnerable armor plate of the "Crowninshield" against Admiral Schley at the Court of Enquiry yesterday. One was fired by Ensign U. S. Macy, who was a naval cadet aboard the "Crowninshield," and the other by Ensign Marble, also of the same vessel. They disproved the evidence by which the "Government's side" has hoped to show Schley guilty of two of the most serious charges against him, the failure to destroy the Colon on May 31 and the retrograde movement.
