FOR HURDLING AT PIMLICO.

Col. J. Hampton Hoge Addresses a Republican Meeting.

Schedule of the Maryland Steeplechase Association Meeting.

ALEXANDRIA, Va., Oct. 24.—Col. J. Hampton Hoge, Republican nominee for Governor, spoke for about two hours in the opera house tonight to a representative audience of several hundred citizens.

The Maryland Steeplechase Association will hold its fall race meeting at Pimlico on October 31, November 1 and 2. This is one of the most notable sporting events held every year in the South, and is attended by many of the best people of both Washington and Baltimore.

The meeting was called to order promptly by the chairman, Joseph L. Crupper. The following were on the stage: King Agnew, Joseph L. Crupper, Charles King, Marshall L. King, A. A. Wardell, Judge M. H. Wood, S. Brown Allen, Judge E. G. Galt, and Captain Wood.

An extra race has been added for Saturday, November 2. The conditions of this race, the entries for which close on the course at 2 p. m. October 24, are as follows:

Col. Hoge, in his speech, attacked the national platform of the Democratic party. He also assailed Mr. Montague, his opponent. In discussing the Constitution, he stated that he believed that after the work of the convention is finished, the proposed constitution will not be worth the paper upon which it is written.
