ACT ON BILLS FOR DISTRICT.

Commissioners Decide as to Their Reports.

APPROVE THE TAX MEASURES.

Think Substitution of 6 Per Cent Interest on Arrearages for Penalties and Costs Will Facilitate Collections—Semi-Annual Payments Given Approval.

The District Commissioners have decided to recommend the enactment of "a bill to receive arrangements of taxes due the District to July 1, 1900, at 6 per cent per annum, in lieu of penalties and costs." The recent improvement in the method of keeping the record of overdue taxes, the Commissioners will state, "has enabled the Assessor to furnish to taxpayers information respecting their indebtedness which was previously so difficult of ascertainment that a large amount of taxes was in arrears more through the inability of the tax office to furnish a correct statement of the accounts than an indisposition on the part of the property owners to pay them.

Would Bring to Payments. "The Commissioners and the tax officers are of the opinion that the legislation contemplated by this bill would not only be an act of deserved leniency in a great many instances, but would result in an immediate payment of a large amount of back taxes that might otherwise be deferred through the inability of the taxpayer to meet the great additional burden of accrued penalties and costs, and materially facilitate the current business of the office by clearing the tax records of a large number of long-standing accounts.

Change in Tax Collections. The report framed by the Commissioners upon House bill 4372, "To regulate the collection of taxes in the District of Columbia," will define the purpose of the measure, and will state that it has received expressions of approval from many taxpayers in the city and county. The Commissioners state that they approve it and recommend its enactment. While the proposed legislation would permit the payment of taxes semi-annually, the Commissioners are of the opinion that it would have a tendency to encourage the payment of these taxes in one installment, which, in the opinion of the Assessor, would facilitate the performance of business in his office and otherwise conduce to economy of administration and the convenience of the tax-paying public. The Commissioners quote from the annual report of the Collector of Taxes, in which he recommends such legislation.

Disposal of Dead Bodies. The report of the Commissioners upon Senate bill 4953, relating to the disposal of dead bodies in the District of Columbia, will favor a little delay in action upon the subject for several months. The Commissioners state that they have been informed by the Health Officer that a bill having substantially the same object in view, and reasonably satisfactory to the professional interests involved, has been prepared and will be presented to Congress by a representative of the medical colleges in the District. The Commissioners prefer that legislation on the subject should take this course, as it will enable them to frame their report upon it in the light of such expressions of public opinion as the introduction of the measure may bring forth.
