

RABBI LOEB OBJECTS TO SUNDAY CLOSING

Believes That a Sabbath Should Be Generally Observed.

SPEAKS FOR ORTHODOX JEW

Submits to District Commissioners His Belief That Appointment of First Day of Week Would Subvert Religious Freedom.

Pursuant to the request of the District Commissioners that the several orthodox and individuals represented at the recent hearing on the proposed Sunday legislation should submit their views in writing, Rabbi Julius T. Loeb, of the congregation Adath Israel, has written to the board protesting against the passage of the bill pending in Congress. Rabbi Loeb speaks for the orthodox Hebrews of the city, and takes the ground that the proposed legislation is unnecessary and subversive of the rights of a large part of the population of the District.

MINOR MUNICIPAL MATTERS OF INTEREST

By order of the Commissioners, Rudyard I. Smith is appointed inspector in the Water Department at \$2.50 per day, to take effect when he reports for duty.

The Commissioners have directed that E. H. Grove and A. Marks, now designated as skilled laborers in the Water Department at \$2.50 per day, shall hereafter be rated as inspectors at the same compensation.

The Commissioners have recommended favorable action upon the amendment intended to be proposed by Senator McMillan to H. R. bill 14,915, relative to the electrical department of the District government.

The Commissioners have reported on Senate bill 5299, "Regulating the use of parking, sidewalks, and roadways in the city of Washington," that they know of no necessity for the proposed legislation.

The Commissioners have recommended favorable action upon the amendment intended to be proposed by Senator Birmingham to H. R. bill 14,915, providing that all members of class 1 of the Metropolitan Police Force who have efficiently served two years therein shall, by reason thereof, become privates in class 2.

The Chief Engineer of the Fire Department has forwarded to the Commissioners a recommendation that Colin C. McKay be appointed as watchman in the department, vice John R. Groves, promoted, the appointment to take effect June 1.

Mr. Henry White, of 2508 University Place, has requested that the Commissioners make a favorable report on the bill to extend Euclid Avenue from Lafayette Place to Fifteenth Street. The bill has been noted and filed by the Commissioners for future action.

City Solicitor has reported to the Commissioners that in his opinion the contract of the District with Mr. Thomas Smith to furnish 45,000 pine bridge lumber has been completed. Mr. Smith notified the Commissioners of this several days ago, and the matter was referred to the Solicitor for a legal opinion.

LONG LOST SON SERVING UNCLE SAM

Walter Bolger Ran Away From Home and Enlisted in the Navy.

ON TRAINING SHIP FRANKLIN

Granted a Week's Furlough and Will Return to His Home in Yonkers, N. Y.—May Conclude to Serve Out His Enlistment.

A world search ended in this city yesterday, when Paul S. Bolger, a wealthy resident of Yonkers, N. Y., succeeded in locating his eighteen-year-old son, Walter Bolger, who disappeared from his home in New York State six months ago, after the father had spent thousands of dollars in seeking to all points of the globe in a fruitless endeavor to ascertain the whereabouts of his long lost son. Young Bolger was located Tuesday aboard the United States training ship Franklin, lying off Hampton Roads, where he had enlisted to serve Uncle Sam for a period of five years.

The missing youth, sunburned and tanned, and none the worse for his six months' stay away from home. He admitted, when confronted by his father, that he relished the life of a sailor, and that he had no desire to leave it.

His father communicated with the Navy Department officials, and succeeded in securing a furlough of one week for the boy. The party then came to this city yesterday, accompanied by a younger brother, who came with his father on his tireless search, and are now stopping at the St. James Hotel. They leave this afternoon for Yonkers, N. Y., a happy, reunited family. When seen by a Times reporter in his apartment at the St. James Hotel, Mr. Bolger was in high spirits.

Long Search Ended.

Yes, my long search is ended, and thank God for it. One cannot appreciate the feelings of a father after he has succeeded in locating his son after a search of six months in all parts of the world. Walter and I have not compared notes yet, and I have not taken any steps yet looking toward his discharge from the navy. It is a matter which lies with him. During the six months I searched for my boy, I was in communication with nearly every part of the world, and thank God I have succeeded. Walter has a good home, and I don't know what could have induced him to enter the navy.
