

MAJOR DAINGERFIELD WINS BROOKLYN DERBY EASILY

Repeats Victory of Hanover and Handspring, His Progenitors.

ARTVIS CAPTURES THE TREMONT

Green Morris' Good Colt Beats Whitechapel by a Head.

CRACK JOCKEYS ARE FINED

Major Daingerfield's Victory Adds \$5,000 to Phil Dwyer's Wealth Because He Owned the Colt's Father and Grandfather—Big Crowd Present.

NEW YORK, June 12.—Fifteen thousand racing enthusiasts were attracted to Gravesend this afternoon by the running of the \$10,000 Brooklyn Derby and the \$10,000 Tremont Stakes, together with five other well-filled events. The weather was also an inducement to make the trip from the torrid city, inasmuch as cool breezes blew up from the ocean and tempered the rays of the blazing orb overhead.

The track was heavy in spots, which made fast time out of the question, and also out public form to a marked degree, as only three favorites finished first. Two of them, Major Daingerfield and Artvis, were successful in the two big stake events, and as both carried an ocean of money, their triumphs made up for other reverses.

Like Father, Like Son. There was quite a bit of sentiment attached to Major Daingerfield's victory in the Derby, and, incidentally, a share of the honors for Philip J. Dwyer, president of the Brooklyn Jockey Club.

Daingerfield the Favorite. Major Daingerfield, who is a magnificent black, had shown such impressive work at the distance that the talent was ready to heap the money on him long before the first orders appeared.

Van Rouse Meets Defeat. CHICAGO, Ill., June 12.—The \$15,000 two-year-old, Van Rouse, recently purchased by John F. Drake, went down to defeat for the first time in his career this afternoon at Harlem, when High Chancellor beat him.

Won by Ten Lengths. Major Daingerfield, with Odum and one-half behind, Homestead being third, and Emshee last. This was the order as they entered the backstretch, but at the three-quarter pole Major Daingerfield rumbled on even terms with Mr. Whitney's colt, who was literally run off his feet in the next half mile.

Artvis by a Head. The Tremont Stakes, one of the star two-year-old events of the year, was a dash of about six furlongs, the longest distance asked of two-year-olds so far this season.

Secundus Wins Stake. Gentlemen's Cup Race at Latonia Captured by the Favorite.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, June 12.—The Gentlemen's Cup race was the feature of the card at Latonia this afternoon. Secundus, the favorite, ridden by Mr. Carey, was the winner.

When sent away, Fire Eater was last, with River Pirate, Whitechapel and Whorler out in front. River Pirate was shut in and dropped back in the first sixteenth. The same thing happened to Whitechapel.

Ten youngsters went to the post, where all sorts of monkey shins were in order. The starter soon put on the fines, Shaw, Odum, O'Connor, Bullman and Buchanan receiving penalties of \$104 each.

Fifty yards from the wire Artvis was a head in front of Whitechapel, but the latter was gaining every inch and the crowd, filled with excitement, yelled in his might. In the last jump Whitechapel seemed to get up in time to win by a whisker, but the judges said Artvis lasted long enough to get the verdict by a nose of a couple of inches. Whitechapel beat Fire Eater a length for the place.

GOSSIP OF THE TURF.

Wednesday's rain at Sheepshead Bay will make a material change in the prospects of several of the horses in tomorrow's Suburban. If the track is heavy Advance Guard may not go to the post, and if he should, he would stand little show of winning, as the Great Tom horse does not like the mud. On the other hand, Herbert reveals in it and his chances would be greatly improved; not that he can run a better race in heavy going than he can on a fast track, but that the other horses are not so much at home in mud as he is. Blues and Gold Heels can run in the mud, but they do not fancy it like Herbert does. Contend should profit by a heavy track, as his legs are on the alling list. Trainer Shields says that if no more rain falls he will not be afraid of Advance Guard's chances, as on a good track the horse will run up to his form.

Jack Bennett has repurchased Kinsgrain from Johnny McCafferty, and the horse won his first race of the year the other day. The horse's victory shows what a change of riders will do. Kinsgrain lost several races with Miller in the saddle, purely because of incompetent riding. Kingrain has a bad ankle or he would be a very valuable animal.

Jacob Worth has again made a change of trainers. He entrusted his string of runners, which included the three-year-old Gem Paul, to Billy Oliver not long since, but he was dissatisfied with the latter's methods and a few days ago the horses were turned over to Ed Graves.

Green Morris was unable to secure the services of Jockey Bulman to ride his entry in the American Derby and he has engaged the services of the veteran rider, Stuart Doggett. It is likely that Mr. Morris will pin his faith to Old England in the Chicago race.

Arsenal, who will be shipped next Wednesday, will be ridden by O'Connor, and the latter says he expects to win. Winnie will have to strain his goggled eyes pretty hard to catch sight of the winning post ahead of Heno.

The Haagin horses from the West have arrived at Sheepshead Bay. They include Cupid, Juvenalis, and Sir Hugh, and the first two will come very near winning on their first attempt, if work counts for anything. The crack two-year-olds, Subdue and Breyline, the property of Jacob Rubino, accompanied the Haagin horses.

The yearling stater to the crack Belmont two-year-old, Mizzen, is named Donna Esperanza. She is a bay filly and is said to have shown speed.

In tomorrow's St. Louis Derby, Terra Firma will likely be the favorite, and Beauchamp will pilot him. Jockey Matthews will ride the Turney colt, Glenwater; Coburn will be on Abaddin, Dominick will likely ride Lora Pomona, and Post, Chicago will probably be up on Orlis. The Turney Brothers think they can win with their colt, Glenwater. The race ought to be a good one.

Latonia's big race tomorrow will be the Cincinnati Trophy for two-year-olds. It is a rich stake and several of the best youngsters in the West will compete, some of which will be shipped from Chicago in addition to the cash added. Mayor Fleischmann has donated a beautiful loving cup.

C. C. DUNCANSON A VOLUNTARY BANKRUPT

Places Liabilities at \$189,348, Assets \$373,330.

Is But Temporarily Embarrassed and Is Ready to Surrender Property for Benefit of Creditors.

The announcement that Mr. Charles C. Duncanson had filed a petition yesterday morning asking to be adjudged a voluntary bankrupt, and stating his readiness to surrender his property for the benefit of his creditors, spread rapidly, and in less than an hour afterward many people went to the City Hall to see the papers in the case.

Assets Are Large. According to the schedules filed, Mr. Duncanson's indebtedness amounts to \$189,348.81, and his assets, including life insurance for \$93,500 amount to \$373,330.13.

Mr. Duncanson owes less than \$100,000, and his available assets, including his equities in real estate, which have been very conservatively valued, together with his stock, bonds, and other securities, which include the very best securities in the city, will easily aggregate \$270,000, so that there are more than sufficient assets to pay every liability in full, and have \$75,000 left for Mr. Duncanson.

Heavy Life Insurance. The above statement of assets includes only those securities and property which are considered to be gilt edge. In addition Mr. Duncanson has \$93,500 life insurance and other claims which bring the total, as shown in the schedule, to \$456,660.13, from which sum \$83,300, trusts on real estate, should be deducted, leaving the net assets at \$373,330.13.

Mr. Duncanson is well known in business and financial circles, having managed a very successful brokerage and auction business in this city for many years. During the past twenty years his place of business has been at the corner of Ninth and D Streets. He also took an active interest in other financial enterprises. Among those in which he was a member of the board of directors are:

In Many Concerns. The National Capital Investment Company, the Ivy City Land Syndicate, the Northern Market Company, the Colonial Fire Insurance Company, the United States Electric Lighting Company, the Riggs Fire Insurance Company, the Standard Butterine Company, the American Security and Trust Company, the Lincoln National Bank, the Washington Gas Light Company, the Columbia Railway Company, the Firemen's Insurance Company, and the Home Plate Glass Company.

During the last few months several suits have been filed against Mr. Duncanson to recover small amounts. Some of these suits, it is understood, have been settled, while others are still on the docket of the Supreme Court of the District.

The reported liabilities and assets are much larger in this case than in any other filed in the District in recent years.

MORE PUBLIC WORK. The District Commissioners have received from the Inspector of Plumbing proposals and schedules for connecting certain premises in the District with public sewers and water mains.

He recommends that William Rothwell, of 24 Ninth Street northwest, be awarded the contract for items M and I; that the contract for items C and G be awarded to Messrs. E. F. Brooks & Co.; that Messrs. Whelan & Linnigan be awarded the contract for items A, D, E, F, and K, and that all bids for item L be rejected for the reason that the funds available from the current appropriation of \$2,500 for this work will not be sufficient to do more than the amount recommended.

Grant Request for New Alley. The District Surveyor has transmitted to the Commissioners a petition and plans from Annie E. Bealle asking for the opening of an alley in block 4 of the subdivision of part of the tracts known as Woodward's Lot and Peter's Mill Seat, and for closing the present alley. The Surveyor recommends that the request be granted.

Keeler, patriotic instructor of the Department of the Woman's Relief Corps.
