

BILL POSTING NOT YET PROHIBITED

Regulating Legislation Not Effective Until November 1.

ATTORNEY DUVALL'S OPINION

Law Providing Tax Not Operative in Controlling Sections Until the Date of Issue of Licenses—An Analogous Case Cited.

A new lease of life was infused into the much maligned bill board yesterday in an opinion rendered by Corporation Counsel A. B. Duvall, who holds that the provisions of paragraph 39 in the last District appropriation bill are to be effective only from and after November 1. In the meantime, nothing can be done, and the case remains in statu quo. Mr. Duvall adds, however, that he is of the opinion that hereafter paragraph 39 will afford a means for the abatement of the objectionable bill posting complained of.

The opinion was based not upon the communication received yesterday from Anna M. Wilson and J. W. Ernschaw, but upon a previous and analogous case, in which the writer called attention to section 7, paragraph 39, of the appropriation act for the District of Columbia, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902, approved July 1, 1902, which requires bill posters to pay an annual tax of \$20 "before engaging in said business, and prohibits the placing, exhibiting, maintaining, or continuing any advertisement or poster, except upon such land, houses, buildings, bill boards, fences, or other structures, as the Commissioners may, in their discretion, authorize in writing for that purpose."

"Said section imposes a license tax upon various classes of business in the District," Mr. Duvall explains, "and by its paragraph 3 provides that all licenses shall date from November 1 in each year, and expire on October 31 following, except as otherwise provided. The licenses for bill posters, no other time having been designated, is therefore to run from November 1, 1902."

"I am of the opinion that the provisions in said paragraph 39 are to be read together, and the paragraph is to be treated as an entirety; and that, therefore, the provision prohibiting the placing, exhibiting, maintaining, or continuing any advertisement or poster except upon such land, buildings, fences, etc., as the Commissioners may, in their discretion, authorize in writing, is to be effective only from and after November 1, prox."

Analogous Case Cited. "The Court of Appeals in Bush vs. District of Columbia (1 App., D. C. 1) held that the act of Congress of March 2, 1903, regulating the sale of liquors in the District of Columbia, in which there was no expressed intent to revoke the annual licenses granted under the old law, did not affect the unexpired licenses thereunder, and that such licenses had the right to stand thereunder until the expiration of their term."

"I am further of the opinion that said paragraph 39 will afford a means for the abatement of the objectionable bill posting complained of."

The District Commissioners have directed that the compensation of C. S. "The urgency of the information, the letter continues, will appear from the fact that the Secretary of the Treasury and the Commissioners now have under consideration the preparation of plans for the building, which would be greatly furthered by having at hand the data they herein request."

Mr. B. H. Warner, who recently asked to be informed as to what was done with the old material in the work of constructing curb and sidewalk on M Street, for which assessment had been levied against subplot 25, square 35, has been informed that the old brick removed from the walk was hauled to the property yard as public property. Had it been practicable to use it in the new work it would have been done.

Mr. William H. Keene has been in-

formed that the request of himself and others that the District sewer system be connected with Takoma Park, Md., that the work would not be a proper charge against any existing appropriation.

Mr. J. M. Dunn has been informed that his proposal to construct a chemical engine house on lot 2, block 1, Congress Heights, for the sum of \$19,969 has been accepted.

A treasury warrant for \$1,500 has been placed to the credit of William F. Mattingly, treasurer of the Washington Hospital for Folliings, one for \$1,000 to the credit of Amos J. In passing upon the explanation of the United States Electric Lighting Company as to why certain house connections were put but thirteen inches below the surface instead of eighteen inches, as required by the regulations, Capt. Chester Harding, the acting Engineer Commissioner, has recommended that the required minimum depths of top of conduits below the surface grade be maintained at eighteen inches as heretofore, and that under exceptional conditions the applications of the electric companies shall indicate that the ordinary depth would make their work unreasonably expensive, or otherwise expedient. In the cases in question, Mr. L. E. Sinclair, general superintendent of the electric company, stated that to get house connections eighteen inches below the surface it would be necessary for them to reconstruct their old handholes, and all of the old work. Whenever it is possible, and on all new construction work, they always put the connections eighteen inches below the surface. As soon as they get outside of the handholes they slant the duct to the required depth into the premises.
