Chemical experiments proved that where a boric preservative was used with butter, such addition did not constitute a material "used with intent or effect of causing the absorption of abnormal quantities of water, milk or cream," and that it did not constitute a substance used with intent or effect of cheapening in cost the product, as the law specified.
