

MR. ECKELS SCORES THE U. S. TREASURY SYSTEM

Stirring Address to Pennsylvania Bankers.

"RIGHTS OF BUSINESS MAN"

Made a Plea for Less Governmental Intimacy and Influence in Business World—Officers Elected.

(Special to The Washington Times.) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 25.—The feature of the eighth convention today of the Pennsylvania Bankers' Association was the address by Mr. James H. Eckels, the former Comptroller of the Currency and now president of the Commercial National Bank of Chicago.

Continuing, Mr. Eckels discussed the relation which the General Government bears toward the private business affairs of the country.

Opposes Legislative Interference.

"I wish to speak for the right of the business man to manage, regulate, and control the interests in which he has invested his own property, unhampered by any improper legislative enactment and free from useless supervision of regulating commissions and other bodies, both national and of State origin."

Stocking of the Ignorant.

Mr. Eckels stated that while the Treasury Department by force of law undertakes to be a bank, it is founded upon no banking principles and is conducted in accordance with no recognized banking rules, and that in its substructure it is the bank of the mere safety deposit vault or the stocking of the ignorant or suspicious citizen.

Not on Business Principles.

"If all in business received deposits only to hoard them, soon interchange of commodities would cease, manufacturing come to a standstill, agricultural interests languish and transportation lines grow idle. That which no business man accepts as a correct principle in his own undertakings his Government enforces, to the wasting of his own and his fellow's substance."
