

AWAIT MR. HILL'S SIGNAL

New York Fight Begins When He Gives the Word.

M'CARREN FOR CHAIRMAN

Party Will Make Campaign of Education With Socialistic Plank About Government Ownership of Mines.

NEW YORK, Oct. 3.—The Democratic State committee will open campaign headquarters in this city as soon as Mr. Hill gives the signal.

Chairman Campbell of the State committee will not appoint the executive committee until he has consulted the candidate for governor.

His appointment would please all factions of the party. He is a shrewd and experienced politician and personally is one of the best known and most popular men in the Democratic party in the State.

It is a matter of common gossip that Mr. Hill has undertaken to raise a campaign fund of \$250,000 or more and that there will be work for every party worker.

Members of the State committee say that the party is to make a campaign of education with the socialistic plank about government ownership of coal mines as one of the chief features.

LOCOMOTIVE ENGINEERS WANT INCREASED WAGES

Demand the Outcome of the Secret Session of Brotherhood Just Concluded in Chicago.

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—The secret session of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers at the Sherman House ended yesterday, and the representatives of the order left town immediately.

Great Chief Engineer P. M. Arthur declined to discuss the object of the meeting, but it was learned that the subject under consideration was a demand for an increase in wages.

The engineers employed on twelve railroads were represented. The engineers assert that the tonnage of freight trains has become so much heavier that there is no comparison with the work they had to do when the schedule now in force was adopted.

The demand of the engineers is not to be confined to the few roads represented, but is general. The meeting here was of Western men exclusively.

HONORS FOR DEAD NAVAL HERO



The funeral of Rear Admiral James E. Joubert, retired, who died Wednesday, was held at 11 o'clock yesterday.

The casket, which was enshrined with the Stars and Stripes, was covered with beautiful floral tributes.

The casket was carried from the residence to the hearse by eight stalwart sailors from the United States ship Lancaster the military escort, which consisted of a battalion of seamen from the Lancaster, a battalion of engineers from the Washington Barracks, three troops of cavalry, and one battalion of artillery from Fort Myer.

The pallbearers were: Rear Admirals Samuel R. Franklin, Andrew E. K. Benham, James A. Greer, Philip Hichborn, Col. Green C. Goodloe, Marine Corps; Medical Director Richard C. Dean, U. S. N.; Senator J. S. C. Blackburn, and Col. James M. Morgan, formerly of the United States navy and later of the Confederate army.

The wife and son of the deceased were prevented from attending the funeral by ill-health. They are both in Florida.

CUT THROAT WITH RAZOR

TO TRY CAPT. LYNCH FOR ALLEGED IRREGULARITIES

Certain Financial Transactions of Several Years' Standing to Be Looked Into.

Capt. J. A. Lynch, of the Twenty-eighth Infantry, is to be tried by court-martial in the Department of the East for alleged irregularities in certain financial transactions which occurred several years ago when he was stationed in New York State.

Charges were preferred to the War Department several months ago against Captain Lynch, who was then in the Philippines, with a result that the Secretary of War ordered him to proceed to this country for trial.
