

MYSTERY RECALLED BY PROBATING OF WILL

Death of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Turner in March, 1899.

BODIES FOUND IN HOUSE

No Explanation by Detectives, But Murder and Suicide Theory Accepted.

The death of Weston B. Turner and his wife, Ellen V. Turner, on March 23, 1899, at Falls Church, Va., was recalled yesterday by the termination of the litigation over his estate.

Not Double Murder.

For several days the local detectives worked hard to solve the mystery surrounding the death of Mr. and Mrs. Turner. Nothing, however, was developed which led to the belief that a double murder had been committed.

The terms of the will left by Mr. Weston led to the belief that he killed her and then took his own life. The testament was dated March 11, 1899, only a few days before the double tragedy.

Litigation Over Estate.

Proceedings for the possession of the estate, which is valued at about \$40,000, were begun by Mitchell A. Skinner, a committee for Jacob Y. Turner, and others.

The case was on hearing before Chief Justice Bingham last fall, and resulted in the jury failing to agree upon a verdict. The principal question involved was the validity of the will of Weston B. Turner.

The will of Washington W. Whitlow, dated March 21, 1901, was filed yesterday for probate in the office of the Register of Wills for the District.

The will of John Chandler, dated March 20, 1886, was filed for probate yesterday. He leaves all his personal property and one-half of his real estate to his wife, Mrs. Lucy C. Chandler.

If his brother, William Chandler, should outlive his wife, the testator directs that he shall receive the income from half the estate.

Mary Ann Fowler, by her will, dated October 23, leaves \$100 to her nephew, George F. DeMaime and one-fourth of the remainder of her estate to her brother, John W. DeMaime.

DAVID C. BELL DEAD AT HIS GEORGETOWN HOME

Father of Charles J. Bell and Uncle of Prof. Alexander Graham Bell, Passes Away of Old Age.

David Charles Bell, father of Charles J. Bell, the banker, brother of Alexander Melville Bell, of the Volta Bureau, and uncle of Prof. Alexander Graham Bell, died yesterday morning at his home, 1525 Thirty-fifth Street northwest.

Mr. Bell was born in Scotland, but had spent most of his life in America, particularly in Washington.

WASHINGTON AS SEEN BY JAPANESE EYES

Secret of Silken Panel's Peculiarity Discovered.

A wall in the private office of First Assistant Postmaster General Wynne is decorated with a silk panel about six feet long by three feet wide, on which is worked in the most intricate and beautiful weave of colored silks and gold, the shield of the United States.

Visitors who saw the picture invariably noticed something peculiar about the eagle and the painting, but were unable to define just what it was. They united in saying that the panel was one of the finest examples of American art.

The panel is being held in the custody of the Dead Letter Office. It was sent from the Philippines to an address in Brooklyn, but was refused, and it was later discovered that the number given was the home of a deserter from the army who probably thought the package was a decoy.

ENGLISH EVANGELIST COMING TO WASHINGTON

The Rev. G. Campbell Morgan, Known as Moody's Successor, to Hold Revival Services Here.

The Rev. G. Campbell Morgan, the English evangelist, known as the successor of the Rev. Dwight L. Moody, will conduct revival services in Washington for eight days, commencing November 29.

TRUSTEES OF CATHOLIC UNIVERSITY TO MEET

Rector and Vice Rector Will Be Selected.

The annual meeting of the trustees of the Catholic University will be held in this city on November 12, at which a rector and vice rector will be selected.

The present rector is the Right Rev. Thomas J. Conaty, who was named four years ago to succeed the first rector, Archbishop John J. Keane, of Dubuque. It is understood that Bishop Conaty will be his own successor, if he will accept.

Should the papers appointing Bishop Montgomery, of Los Angeles and Monterey, Cal., auxiliary Archbishop of San Francisco, arrive, Bishop Conaty will be unanimously recommended by the hierarchy for the Los Angeles diocese.

If none of these events happen before November 12 Rector Conaty will be urged to continue in the university until he succeeds to an episcopacy.

PATRIOTIC ORDER OF AMERICA OPENS CAMP

Sixth Annual Meeting Begins With Large Attendance.

The Patriotic Order of America began its sixth national camp yesterday. Business sessions will be held today, concluding with the annual election of officers. Tomorrow will be devoted to sightseeing. The meetings are held at 430 Ninth Street northwest.

Ritualistic work was carried out at the hall last night and degrees conferred upon candidates of the six local lodges. The union degree team of Baltimore was in charge of the work.

DECISIONS ANNOUNCED IN SUITS FOR DIVORCE

Justice Hagner Grants Decrees in Seven Cases, Denying Only One.

Justice Hagner yesterday announced his decision in seven suits for divorce. In every instance except one he granted the petition of the complainant. This was the case of McCabe against McCabe, in which the husband was granted a divorce on a cross bill, while the wife's petition was dismissed.

In the cases of Irene L. Miller against M. Preston Miller, for divorce on the ground of habitual drunkenness, and Annie M. Turley against Charles S. Turley, because of desertion, the decrees have not yet been signed.

HAWAII PROGRESSING UNDER AMERICAN RULE

Annual Report Made by Governor Sanford B. Dole.

The Secretary of the Interior has received from Sanford B. Dole, governor of the Territory of Hawaii, the annual report for the last fiscal year on the affairs, progress and development of the island.

The report shows that the population of the Territory is 154,061—males, 106,369; females, 47,692; native born, 63,231; foreign born, 90,780; foreign white, 12,749. Among the foreign-born population the Chinese are predominant, with 27,741, and are followed by Portuguese with 6,512; Japanese, 5,637; Atlantic Islanders, 1,157; German, 1,154. Out of a total population of 137,768 of ten years old and over, 72,148 are unable to speak the English language.

The total cash on hand in the territorial treasury on June 30, 1932, was \$287,131. The total amount of property subject to ad valorem taxes, according to assessment appraisals, was \$110,388,578. An income tax imposed by the Legislature of 1931 realized \$287,366 during the fiscal year.

The number of pupils in all schools in Hawaii is now 17,518, an increase of 72 per cent over ten years ago.

The death rate from leprosy has shown a marked decrease for the last decade, largely due to better sanitary conditions at the Molokai settlement. The number of patients there June 30 last was 915.

The shipments of merchandise, not including specie for the past year, are less in value than the previous year by \$3,280,695. All of this except \$86,885 is chargeable to a decrease in the market value of that article and not to a diminished production. The sugar shipped the past year was 720,553,357 pounds, an increase of 29,674,123 pounds.

Of the total value of shipments, not including specie from the Territory during the past year of \$24,793,735, the value of foreign merchandise shipped was \$38,815, as against a value of \$24,754,922 of domestic merchandise shipped. Of this total value the shipments to foreign countries were worth \$63,574 and those to the mainland were worth \$24,730,183.

The report submits the estimates for appropriations by Congress for the next fiscal year, aggregating \$1,106,000, of which \$750,000 is for the construction of a breakwater at Hilo harbor; \$250,000 for widening channel Honolulu harbor and dredging channel entrance and harbor to a depth of thirty feet low water; \$220,000 for a postoffice and custom house at Hilo, and \$73,000 for the erection and maintenance of lighthouses at Honolulu harbor, Oahu; Makapuu Point, Oahu; Kahului, Maui; Oona, Hawaii; Kailua, Hawaii; Kawaihae, Hawaii; Mahukoua, Hawaii; Kalaheokalaau, Molokai.

SALE OF PROPERTY TO NEW YORK MEN DENIED

Reported That Apartment House Will Be Built at H Street and Vermont Avenue Northwest.

There has been a persistent report the last few days in real estate circles that the property at the northeast corner of H Street and Vermont Avenue northwest, had been sold to New York parties, and the present building was to be replaced by an apartment house.

NEW ARMORED CRUISERS TO BE HEAVILY ARMED

Washington and Tennessee Will Have More Powerful Gun Fire Than Any Others in Their Class Afloat.

Acting Secretary of the Navy Darling yesterday approved the report of the majority of the Board on Construction recommending that the armored cruisers Washington and Tennessee be equipped with engines capable of developing 23,000 horse power, with an equivalent speed of about twenty-two knots, six inches thickness of Krupp armor above the water line, and a heavy battery, which will make these vessels more powerful in gun fire than any other armored cruisers in the world.

Coincident with his approval of the board's report the Acting Secretary announced that proposals for building vessels will be received at the Navy Department up to noon on January 6, 1933, when they will be publicly opened.

INDIANS MADE BETTER BY LEARNING OF TRADE

Report of Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute Regarding Teaching of Red Men.

It is stated in the annual report of the Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute, made public yesterday, that the young Indians who are trained in agriculture and the mechanic arts in that school go out better equipped physically and morally than those who take only the academic course.
