NO DEFINITE RULE AS TO THIRD TERMS.

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 19.—Republican State Chairman Rollins was specially interviewed this afternoon. He was asked what would be done about third-term office holders in North Carolina, and replied he could not say definitely. President Roosevelt having said he would adopt no definite rule as to third terms. Each applicant must stand on his merits. A certain rotation in office is necessary, yet the fitness of each applicant enters into the question. In the case of eastern politicians there will be in a number of places new appointments, but in some no person is known so fit as the present incumbents. There are six large federal appointments and as to these it is not known what will be done. It depends upon what the majority of the party leaders in the state think at the time. It is a year away before the vacancies occur in five of these positions, namely, two collectors, two marshals and one district attorney.

WHITE MAN ARRESTED FOR EXCURSION TRAIN KILLING.

Estonton, Ga., Jan. 19.—Tom Waits, a white man, who shot and killed John Wrigley, another white man and mill operative, last summer while returning from Macon on an excursion train, has been arrested at Cedartown, where he is being held awaiting the arrival of Sheriff Marshall of this county, to claim the prisoner. The sheriff has gone to get Waits. Immediately after the killing Waits escaped and has never been heard from until arrested in Cedartown a day or two ago.

Elliot Sails For Europe.

New York, Jan. 19.—President Chas. W. Elliot, of Harvard University, and Mrs. Elliot sailed for Europe today on the steamer Bleucher. Another passenger on the Bleucher was Mrs. Robert S. McCormick, wife of the American ambassador to Russia.

FARMERS AGREE TO REDUCE ACREAGE

GEORGIA FARMERS SIGN AGREEMENT TO LIMIT AMOUNT OF COTTON GROWN.

Dublin, Ga., Jan. 19.—A large meeting of the farmers of Laurens county was held in this city Wednesday. There were more than three hundred farmers at the meeting. Reports were received from each district, which showed that the district meetings were largely attended last Saturday and Monday, and that more than 99 per cent of the farmers are signing the agreement to limit the acreage this year to 15 acres to the plow.

It was decided at the meeting that the agreement to reduce the acreage should be strictly construed. On a large farm the overseer's horse cannot be included in the list of farm animals and the buggy horse of the farmer must not be counted. If only ten acres are cultivated by one horse, twenty acres cannot be cultivated by another, so as to bring up the average. It has been found by comparison that putting the acreage in Laurens county at 15 acres to the plow, reduces the acreage 23 per cent.

Committeemen are now canvassing the county getting farmers to sign the agreement to reduce the acreage. The negro farmers are signing the agreement without a single exception so far.

CHINESE ACCOMPANYING RUSSIANS EITHER AS UNIFORMED BANDITS OR GUIDES.

Tokio, Jan. 19.—It is believed here that the Chinese reported to be accompanying Lieutenant General Mischenko's raiders are either uniformed bandits or soldiers who had been impressed as guides. It is not believed that Chinese regulars have been authorized to join the raiders.

The report that Russian troops are disguised as Chinese is regarded much more seriously and it is under further investigation.

New Commander for Port Arthur.

Tokio, Jan. 19.—It is considered probable that Major General Ilich, General Nogi's chief of staff, will be appointed commander of Port Arthur.

Japs Take British Steamer.

Tokio, Jan. 19.—The Japanese captured the British steamer Oakley in Tushima straits Wednesday afternoon. The vessel left Cardiff on November 17, carrying 5,900 tons of coal for Vladivostok. She was brought to Sasabo.

EXTREME MEASURES

RESORTED TO AT COLUMBUS, GA., TO PREVENT SPREAD OF SMALLPOX.

Columbus, Ga., Jan. 20.—City authorities today placed guards around the Blandford home, in Wynnton, and the quarantine regulations will be strictly enforced, all persons who attempt to disregard them being arrested and prosecuted.

This unusual procedure, which is the most extreme step taken by the authorities during the time mild cases of smallpox have prevailed here, only a few of the cases having proved serious, was taken as the result of the development of two more cases of smallpox at the residence in Wynnton, where Captain Robert H. Blandford, union ticket agent, died of that disease last month. After the death of that gentleman the house was disinfecting by a sanitary expert from the city, who declared that it was then thoroughly safe. Relying upon his judgment Mrs. Blandford took a young married couple to board at the house and it is understood that they occupied the same room which Captain Blandford used in his life time.

MACON GRAND JURY IS AFTER THE GAMBLERS.

Macon, Ga., Jan. 19.—Ben Tutt, the witness who refused Tuesday to answer a question of the superior court grand jury in regard to certain rooms used for gambling purposes, could not be found by deputies of the court.

On his refusal to answer, Tutt was ordered to appear before Judge Felton and show cause why he should not be adjudged in contempt of court. But he did not show up when his name was called and the deputies have been unable to find him.

The investigations of the present grand jury has made Macon rather a warm resort for gamblers.

Banks May Loan on Tobacco.

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 19.—The state senate has passed a bill authorizing banks to advance money on tobacco. The bill was introduced as a measure of relief to the tobacco growers whose crops are tied up in the association organized to wage war upon the alleged tobacco trust.

No Effort to Assassinate Treppoff.

St. Petersburg, Jan. 19.—The report circulated by a London news agency that General Treppoff, former chief of police of Moscow, had been assassinated while on his way to this city is unfounded. The general has arrived in St. Petersburg.

LIVELY RACE FOR COUNTY JUDGE

SEVERAL ASPIRANTS FOR DE SOTO COUNTY OFFICE MADE VACANT BY DEATH.

The Zolfo Advertiser says: Quite a little interest is being manifested in the race for the appointment as county judge of this county. Judge A. E. Pooser and Judge T. J. Lawton, of Arcadia, and Col. J. B. Cochran, of Nocatee, are the aspirants for the position.

No one knows who the governor will appoint, and about the only thing agreed upon is that if one of the trio mentioned does not get it somebody else will.

Judge Pooser is backed by the part of the county committee which endorsed him, while Colonel Cochran bases his hopes on the fact that he has sent up a very large petition from the voters of the county, and has had a number of prominent men in the county write Governor Broward personal letters endorsing him and asking his appointment. Judge Lawton has also sent up a petition signed by a number of voters.

The opinion seems to prevail here that Colonel Cochran will be the appointee. However this is mere conjecture as nothing has been heard from Tallahassee except that Governor Broward was waiting to give all parties a hearing before making an appointment.

PRESBYTERIANS FAVOR UNION

New York, Jan. 18.—After a discussion which continued through an entire day, the Morristown and Orange Presbytery, in session at Morristown, N. J., has decided by a vote of 23 to 17 to accept the majority report of the committee on overtures on union with the Cumberland Presbyterian church, which report favored union, but disapproved of the plan for separate presbyteries.
