PENSACOLA OPERA HOUSE IS TO CHANGE HANDS

REPORTED THAT JAS. M. MULDON IS TO BUY THE PROPERTY FROM MISS SULLIVAN IN THE NEAR FUTURE.

A report, which appears to have some foundation of truth, is in circulation about the city to the effect that the Pensacola opera house is to be sold at an early date by its present owner, Miss Sullivan, of New York, the purchaser being Jas. M. Muldon, one of the most prominent men of the city, and who has large interests and real estate holdings in the city. It was stated on the streets late last night that the deal for the transfer of this valuable property had already been closed, and that the amount to be received by Miss Sullivan was somewhere in the neighborhood of \$50,000. Miss Sullivan, who was formerly a resident of Pensacola, is now in New York, and the parties who are reported as having brought about the sale between Mr. Muldon and Miss Sullivan have been in communication with her for several weeks.

FUNERAL OF MR. STOECKINGER

OFFICERS OF POLICE DEPARTMENT ATTENDED SERVICES AT HOME AND AT CEMETERY.

The funeral of George M. Stoekinger, who was killed Tuesday night on Gregory street by a street car, occurred yesterday afternoon, the funeral services being conducted at the family residence on Cavallos street. There was a large number of persons present at the services, among whom were some of the most personal friends of the deceased police officer. Rev. Mr. Sibley, pastor of the Presbyterian Church conducted the funeral services, and spoke of the life of the deceased in such a manner as to bring tears to the eyes of those who were present. He dwelt at some length upon the devotion of Mr. Stoekinger to his family and at the grave delivered a prayer. The members of the police department who were not on duty attended in a body, and presented a very handsome floral tribute, which was placed upon the grave. The officers who were present were Chief Schad, Deputy Marshal Frank, Captain Fomabella, and Officers Burnham, Humphreys, Ingham, Roach, Abbott, Puhtel, Carlin Villar, Bouske, Kramer, Eberhige, White, Jones, Bobe, Barter, Ray, Neel and Schmitz. The officers were in full uniform. A number of the city officials, including Mayor Welles were also present when the remains were placed at rest in St. John's cemetery.

GENERAL MILES IN JACKSONVILLE

DISTINGUISHED OFFICER IN ATTENDANCE AT GOOD ROADS CONVENTION.

Lieut.-Gen. Nelson A. Miles, United States army, retired, now adjutant-general of the staff of Governor W. L. Douglas, of Massachusetts, arrived in the city last night, and is a guest of the Windsor.
General Miles is in Jacksonville to attend the midwinter conference of the National Good Roads Association. He is on the program to deliver an address on Good Roads as an Aid to the Army.
There is no man in the United States better qualified than Gen. Nelson A. Miles to deliver an address upon this subject. He was the commanding general of the United States army for such a long time and has had enough actual experience in the field to enable him to handle the subject in a manner that will be extremely interesting as well as instructive.
This is the first time that General Miles has visited Jacksonville since the Spanish-American war, when the Seventh army corps, commanded by Maj.-Gen. Fitzhugh Lee, was in camp here. At that time General Miles had temporary headquarters at Tampa, but stopped over in Jacksonville for a brief call upon General Lee.
General Miles arrived in the city about 8 o'clock last night, and was unattended. He drove from the union depot direct to the Windsor Hotel, and was shown at once to his apartments.
While here General Miles will no doubt be shown every courtesy by the city officials, the Board of Trade and good roads convention.

ESCAPED FROM JAIL BUT WERE RECAPTURED.

Green Cove Springs, Jan. 19.—About 8 o'clock yesterday morning Deputy Sheriff Canova went to the jail to feed the prisoners. He left the front door downstairs open, also the door at the head of the stairway, and went to the door of the steel cage, about ten feet due east from it, and unlocked the doors. As he did so, a prisoner that was on the outside of the steel cells ran past him and down and out. Sheriff Canova ran after him, and the three prisoners who were in the cells followed. They all made a break for the swamp. Sheriff Canova overtook the first one that ran out, and as he was returning with him, he met another of the prisoners and stopped him. These two that Sheriff Canova recaptured were negroes. The two white men in jail ran in another direction. Some of the citizens followed them and captured them in the western part of the town. None of them have been tried for the offenses charged, but will be at the next term of the circuit court.

Berriere Will Be Extradited.

Mexico City, Jan. 19.—According to a decision just made by the supreme court George Berriere will be extradited. Berriere is the American who was arrested in Vera Cruz in April last year for having absconded. It is alleged, with \$27,465 American money and \$5,300 Spanish gold, the sums belonging to the firm of Louis C. Smith, of Havana, for whom he was the manager of the branch office in Havana.

Lighthouse on Diamond Shoals.

Washington, Jan. 19.—Representative Small, of North Carolina, has introduced a bill providing for construction of a lighthouse and fog signal on Diamond shoals, on the coast of North Carolina.

Lewis' Nomination Confirmed.

Washington, Jan. 19.—The senate has confirmed the nomination of James Lewis as surveyor-general of Louisiana.
