**YALE STUDENT FATALLY INJURED**

COMPANION SAYS HE WAS ATTACKED BY STRANGE MAN INTO WHOM HE RAN.

New Haven, Conn., Jan. 20.—George Bremner Tennant, a graduate student at Yale University, is dying from a fractured skull, and the cause of his injury is a mystery. A fraternity initiation, a student brawl, a town and gown riot or a quarrel over women may, it is thought, be the explanation. Both the coroner and the faculty are conducting investigations, but no satisfactory solution of the problem has been reached. Only three witnesses have been discovered who are willing to talk of the case, and their stories disagree in small but important details. Two of them are messenger boys and the third is Tennant's intimate friend, Raymond Harman Ashley, of Bound Brook, N. J. Ashley tells the following story:

"Tennant and I were walking along Orange street and by chance bumped into a strange man. I asked his pardon, but he began to use rough language. We suggested that we had already apologized, and that he might have done the same.

"Without another word he attacked us. One of his blows knocked Tennant down, his head striking the sidewalk so hard that he lost consciousness at once. I dragged him away, and finally was able to get him home and in bed. He seemed better until today, when his condition became so serious that physicians were summoned."

Four doors from the scene of the assault is a telegraph office, from which the two messengers saw the affray. One of them, Lawrence Richards, said to-night:

"There were four men in the group, and I am sure all were students." Ashley is a member of the faculty. The affair has caused a tremendous scandal.

**YOUNG WHITE MAN SHOT AT BLUE RIDGE.**

Blue Ridge Ga., Jan. 20.—Joe Weaver, a young white man, was shot to death here last night. He said several other young men left the house of W. E. Brown, in the extreme northern part of town, about 11:30 o'clock and when about thirty yards from the house ten or twelve shots were fired. It is said, Parties rushed from the house to the scene of the shooting, and Weaver was dying when they reached him. Two young men were with him but claimed they were some distance from the parties when the shots were fired, and did not know who did the shooting.

Weaver is said to have killed two men at Ducktown about a year ago. The sheriff of this county held a warrant against him for murder, and he was not generally known that he was in the community until he was killed.

**Demand to See Emperor.**  
St. Petersburg, Jan. 20.—The strike seems to be growing worse. The strike priest, Father Copon, is going from assembling to assembling addressing the workmen. It has been decided to hold a great mass meeting of strikers from all quarters of the city in the palace square at 2 p. m. Sunday, January 22.

Disregarding any opposition on the part of the authorities, even by armed forces, the strikers have agreed to attend the meeting unarmed. They say they are unwilling to meet violence with violence and declare they wish the emperor would hear their delegation.

Father Copon has undertaken to head the procession in clerical garb and carrying a cross. The strikers say they are ready to die in front of the palace, but insist on being heard by the emperor himself.
