THE BOARD OF PUBLIC SAFETY

SHORT SESSION WAS HELD LAST NIGHT AND BUT LITTLE BUSINESS TRANSACTED.

A short session of the Board of Public Safety was held last night, Chairman White presiding, and Messrs. Johnson, Ingraham and Gonzalez being present.

After the reading of the minutes, a communication was read from C. L. Fulton, preferring charges against Officer Puhell for conduct unbecoming an officer and for drinking.

Five men, who had been accepted as firemen, appeared before the Board for examination. Four were accepted, but the other was not recommended by the city physician, who makes the physical examination.

Henry Brown was accepted as a police officer, having undergone all of the examinations required.

The application of Jas. H. Walsh for a position in the police department was referred to the marshal for a recommendation.

The question of selecting a turnkey to succeed Geo. M. Stoekinger, deceased, was discussed at some length and finally referred to the marshal as it was found that he alone could recommend for this position.

During the time of the vacancy the marshal was empowered to employ a fireman as extra patrol driver, as the regular driver was serving as day turnkey.

The application of H. H. Bicker, Chas. Nell, Jr., and William Holst, for positions in the fire department, were referred to the chief.

- 1. The name of the corporation shall be Escambia Land & Manufacturing Company, with its principal office in Pensacola, Florida. 2.
