move cars whenever the city authorities give the word, but this has been withheld on account of the danger of crossed wires of less voltage hanging over the trolley wires. 6,000 telephones are reported "out of use." Nearly, or quite 3,000 telephone poles are down in various sections of the city, and days, perhaps weeks, must elapse before normal conditions can be resumed. Practically the entire systems of the two local telephone companies will be reconstructed. City Without Lights. The electric lighting system of the city was also put out of commission Sunday. The danger of life and property made it unsafe to allow it to be continued, even where the equipment was in order, and the current was ordered shut off. It is likely that this cannot be restored before Sunday. No lights have appeared on the streets since last Sunday evening, and the service to private customers was allowed only to Monday evening. Candles and lamps have been in use where gas was not available.

Isolation is Complete. The isolation of Atlanta has been intensified by the delay to traffic by team from outside points and prices of eggs and chickens have risen to prohibitive figures. Supplies of other staples have been normal, and the coal supply is sufficient to last indefinitely. The temperature, which has hovered about the freezing point during the past five days, has risen a few degrees to-day and ice is melting and dropping slowly from wires and trees. If colder weather shall not come within the next twenty-four hours, it seems probable the embargo will be lifted and substantial progress toward normal conditions may be made.

WANTS LIGHTSHIP MOUTH ST. JOHNS

JACKSONVILLE BOARD OF TRADE WILL TRY TO SECURE LIGHT FOR NAVIGATION AND GIVES GOOD REASONS FOR ACTION.

The Jacksonville Board of Trade is working to secure a lightship at the mouth of the St. Johns river. The resolution was introduced by Telfair Stockton, who, in moving its adoption made provision that a copy of the resolutions be forwarded to the light-house board of the government through the Florida delegation in congress, with the request that the delegation use its influence in securing the end set forth in the resolution.

Why it is Needed. "Whereas, it has been the knowledge of this board of trade that there is a great necessity for a lightship to be placed at some point off the mouth of the St. Johns river, and we would most respectfully urge the honorable lightship board to consider the following reasons as showing the necessity of such a vessel being placed off St. Johns bar.

"First—Vessels coming from southern and central American ports, West Indies and from the ports of the Bahamas would find this the first harbor of refuge on the Atlantic coast.

"Second—This port is well equipped with shipbuilding and repair plants, also with marine ways, and has under construction a large floating dry dock, which would enable vessels entering our port in leaking or damaged conditions to make necessary repairs.

"Third—Vessels from southern ports seeking cargoes would naturally desire to put in here and command twenty-four feet of water at low tide over the bar within a comparatively short time, and the commerce will be largely increased.

"Fourth—As a coaling station, Jacksonville has every advantage possessed by any city on the south Atlantic coast.

"Fifth—Masters and pilots of vessels are of the unanimous opinion that there is no port on the south Atlantic so hard to locate as this one, from the fact of the shore lines being of a flat and uniform character, and without any distinct landmarks.

"Sixth—The present light-house is badly located, and is not modernly equipped; but even with the best equipped lightship would still be very great, not only to the port of Jacksonville, but would serve for the ports of Fernandina and Brunswick.

"Seventh—The necessity of a lightship has been recently demonstrated by the loss of the British schooner, H. B. Homan, bound from Kingston, Jamaica, to Jacksonville, which loss occurred on the 4th of this month, the ship being unable to find the mouth of the river; and the steamer Arapahoe of the City Line, entering our port on the 5th of this month, was detained in a very heavy gale twenty hours off our bar, with several hundred passengers aboard, on account of being unable to locate the mouth of the river.

"Eighth—An immense amount of shipping is annually lost on the Florida coast, and a great many lives are sacrificed, and it is the opinion of this board that a lightship placed off St. Johns bar would lessen the risk, and would in a measure be the means of stopping these losses.

"Ninth—It is resolved, That this statement of the necessities, in our judgment, of a lightship be submitted to the light-house board, and that they be requested to give this matter their consideration.

"Be it also resolved, That our members of congress be requested to present this, our petition."
