## Russians Begin Extensive Movement Against Oyama

Tokio, Feb. 15.—Russians have begun an extensive cavalry movement against Field Marshal Oyama's extreme left. Last night they were attempting to cross the Hun river west of Liao Yang with nine thousand horsemen. Operations have begun west of Chitansu.

## STRIKE IN POLAND IS ABOUT OVER

St. Petersburg, Feb. 15.—Latest reports from Poland indicate that the strike situation in Warsaw and Lodz is exhausting itself. At several places in Southern Russia individual strikes are reported but the workmen's demands are met immediately.

## ROPE BROKE AT HANGING

Bridgeport, N. J., Feb. 15.—Frank Rainger was hanged here to-day for the murder of his wife. The rope broke as the body rebounded and the back of Rainger's head struck a beam of the scaffold breaking his neck.

## NINE BELOW IN CHICAGO.
