THE BUSY LITTLE TOWN OF FLORALA

NEW ENTERPRISES AND NEW IMPROVEMENTS ARE BEING PUSHED WITH AN ENERGY THAT SPEAKS WELL FOR THAT FLOURISHING PLACE.

Florala, Ala., Feb. 18.—After a continual rain extending over a period of more than two weeks the weather has cleared and the coldest spell of the winter struck us Wednesday and Thursday. Notwithstanding the predictions of the weather prophets in Pensacola and Montgomery, the cloudy and warmer weather did not reach us, the thermometer having gone below thirty every night of this week and falling to eleven last Tuesday.

The attorneys for Ab Hammond, charged with the murder of Bud and Jim Tucker on the 1st of last September, and to that end have sued out a writ of habeas corpus and made same returnable to Probate Judge Robinson of this county. Col. Wm. C. Monroe, of counsel for defendant, and the many Florida witnesses were in Andalusia this week in attendance on the hearing of the writ. The defendant, besides Colonel Monroe, is represented by Stewart & Sollie, of Andalusia and Ozark, ex-Congressman Jesse F. Stallings, of Birmingham, and C. E. Reid, of Andalusia; while the prosecution is being conducted by Solicitor Parks, of Troy, and Judge L. J. Reeves, of Pensacola. This case will probably be the most hotly contested and long drawn out that this section has known for some time, and the outcome thereof is awaited with intense interest.

The grading and excavating work on the new hotel building has been completed, and the laying of the foundation is now progressing. The plans for this building call for an expenditure of \$15,000, which, together with the furnishings, will increase the investment to \$20,000. When finished this hotel will be a credit to our town and southern Alabama.

The brick work and roofing of the big Britton-Lamar business building having been finished, the carpenters are now at work on the interior. E. T. Rodwell, who is giving his personal supervision to the work, states that the building will be complete by April 1. Part of the lower floor will be occupied by the department store of the Lake Mercantile Company, which company is composed by W. H. Britton, John W. Cawthon, E. T. Rodwell and Mr. Lamar, of New Orleans, a brother of C. W. Lamar, of the American National Bank, of Pensacola. These gentlemen are putting in a large stock of goods and will conduct one of the largest establishments of its kind in this section. The remainder of the lower floor will be occupied by the Bank of Florala, a banking house. A burglar-proof vault was built in the walls of the building especially for the bank, and when the patent time-lock safe of the bank and its interior fixtures arrive and are put in, it will be as well-equipped as those in larger cities of the state. However, this bank is earning something like 17 per cent on its total capitalization, and can well afford to make these improvements.

A. M. Hyer, of Pensacola, was in our town Wednesday, looking after his property interests here. C. W. Lamar, of Pensacola, was with us last Saturday on a visit connected with the Bank of Florala, in which he is interested. John B. Rider and W. J. Cawthon, have consummated a deal by which they come into possession of about 500 acres of valuable farming land near here. It is understood that they will cultivate peaches and raise cattle on this land, which is well adapted to either purpose.

The fishing in Lake Jackson is excellent just now and it is expected that as soon as the weather moderates somewhat many of our local piscatorial sportsmen will betake themselves thereto with rod and line prepared to catch catfish and eels.
