SAW MILL MEN KICK ON RATES

APPEAL TO RAILROAD COMMISSION AND CASE WILL COME UP MARCH 3.

The Jacksonville Metropolis says: The Georgia Interstate Sawmill Association has been promised a hearing by the Railroad Commission of Florida on March 3rd in Tallahassee to protest against the recent advance of freight rates from all interior Florida points to Florida ports. The lumbermen claim that the class of lumber in Florida is so much smaller in size that it produces so large a percentage of small sizes of lumber, which brings such a low price, that they (the lumbermen) cannot afford to manufacture it.

"The operators," remarked a leading lumberman this morning to a Metropolis reporter, "are now leaving this class of trees in the woods, and it means a very large advance in stumpage, because we cannot cut all the timber on the land."

"This necessarily means that the railroads will have a lighter lumber tonnage in the future, and it is, therefore, essential that the railroads make concessions that will render the product marketable."

"The railroad lines doing business in Florida," continued the speaker, "have shown good profits in the past on lumber traffic, and to advance the average lumber rate about 45 per cent would increase their profits beyond all reason, and at the same time kill the profits to the lumbermen, who would necessarily run their business at a loss."

It is hoped an amicable adjustment of the rate difficulty can be reached. The lumbermen say they are disposed to be reasonable in their demands, and they hope the railroads will exhibit the same spirit.

CARRABELLE ASSURED OF DEEPER WATER.

Carrabelle, Feb. 24.—A letter has been received here from Congressman W. B. Lamar, who writes the glad tidings that congress has appropriated \$15,000 for river and harbor work at Carrabelle. This, added to what has already been done, will help a great deal. There is ten feet now at low water up to the wharf, but we want still more. Citizens are loud in their praises for Hon. W. B. Lamar, assisted by Mr. J. P. Williams and Mr. Hotch, and now we wait patiently for more water. The lumber business is improving, and naval stores trade assuming immense proportions. The steamer Sago is loaded down every trip with rosin and spirits from Ocklocknee farms, and as the heavy rains have swollen the streams, logs are coming in lively.

GOOD WORK OF DREDGE IN KEY WEST HARBOR.

Key West, Feb. 24.—The dredge Key West, which was sent here some time ago to do some much-needed deepening of the different channels leading into the harbor, has (despite adverse weather conditions and the long trips necessary to dump the mud, sand and rock taken from the bottom) removed up to date 20,000 cubic yards from the northwest channel. The work will be continued whenever the weather permits.

The dredgeboat Winyah Bay, that when stationed in these waters a few years ago dredged out the northwest channel, arrived in port Sunday for water. The dredge is bound from Pensacola to Charleston.

FAST MOTORBOAT HOMEWARD BOUND

BROKAW'S "CHALLENGER" STARTED FOR NEW YORK ON FLAT CAR FROM PALM BEACH.

Palm Beach, Feb. 24.—"Homeward bound," the high-speed motorboat Challenger has been placed aboard a flat car and sent to New York by her owner, W. Gould Brokaw.

To know that the Challenger was going away was like parting with a good friend, but Mr. Brokaw will have his boat at Palm Beach again next season for the water carnival and motorboat races.

The Challenger established a splendid record here during regatta week, making a mile in 2:04 2/5, a record which was received everywhere with enthusiasm. Since that time the boat has done better. This was Tuesday morning, February 8, when she made a record of a mile in 2:02 in a trial speed on Biscayne Bay, at Miami.

Mr. Brokaw had the Challenger out on several speed trials on Lake Worth. In one run the boat made a mile in 2:02 2/5, and another in 2:03 1/5—the best of these two records being 1.5 seconds better than her former best record here. There was also a four-mile speed trial, in which the Challenger averaged 2:03 3/20 to the mile, the four miles being covered in 8:12 3/5. The starters were Captain George E. Andrews and A. D. Proctor Smith, the other friends of Mr. Brokaw interested in the record being Ed. R. Bradley and John Moller, Jr., who acted as timers.

Mr. Brokaw stated that at Miami his boat had made the phenomenal record of a mile in 1:41, but that this run, as also the one in which she made a mile in 1:45, was not official. He will remain here for some time longer before returning north.

Tuesday night Mr. Brokaw received a telegram stating that his town house in New York city had been destroyed by fire, none of the valuable collection of curios, oil paintings and art treasures being saved. The house was located at Madison Avenue and Sixty-sixth street.

The Dress of Hindoo Women.

There has been no change in Indian women's dress for 4,000 years. All wear the sari, a single piece of stuff a yard and a quarter wide, ten, twenty, thirty yards long. It is arranged on the body, and forms skirt, garment, veil, first plaited with the hand in accordion folds in front, wound round and round, and the richest end, if embroidered or woven with gold, finally brought over the head. It may be of simple cotton cloth; of silk, plain in design, woven with golden threads; solid with embroidery, strung with pearls, or of kincob, the royal cloth of gold. Some cost thousands of rupees. No pin, hook, button or string, the garment is formed on the architecture of the body, and takes its expression and nobility from its perfect harmony with the lines of the human form. And Indian women, whether of high or low class, have jewels everywhere; have sleeping gems and day gems, as we have day and night shirts—Everybody's.
